GATHERED FROM ALL PARTS OF

THE WORLD.

A Gathering of the Important

Happenings of the Past Week, Pre-

sented in Condensed Form. Most

Likely to Prove Interesting to Our

Many Readers.

G. F. Johnson, of Baker City, has

been appointed deputy warden at

the pen.

Wednesday afternoon fire broke

out in the Little Palace Hotel, the

most prominent hostelry in the

dependence, which resulted in the

destruction of the building and con-

siderable damage to adjoining prop-

erty. The loss is estimated at be-

tween \$5,000 and \$7,000, partly

covered by insurance. The hotel was

owned by J. M. Stark, who has

conducted it for several years, and is

one of the most popular landlords in

the valley.

Chicago, March 27.—Plans are

almost completed here for the launch-

ing of a daily newspaper, to be

owned and operated exclusively by

Threw Carbolic Acid.

A report from Brownsville says

that Barley Shea, an innocent

victim of an acid-throwing episode in

Brownsville Saturday, nearly lost

his eyesight, but refuses to pro-

secute because the woman who threw

the acid apologized. Shea was

walking down Main street early in

the morning in company with Mr.

Lahek. They were passing the Fix

building when a door that they had

just passed was opened. Mr. Shea

naturally turned his head, and just

as he did so a hand holding a glass

of carbolic acid shot out, and Shea

received the contents in his face.

He drew his muffer around his eyes,

and the doctor afterwards told him

that this is all that saved his eye-

sight. His face was badly burned

by the fiery fluid. Mrs. Dove Bond,

formerly of Halsey, admitted that

she threw the acid, but she de-

clared that Shea was not the man

she intended to injure. She said that

a number of young men were

annoying her, and that she inter-

ended to discourage them. She made

an apology to Shea, who has de-

clared that he will not prosecute.

In Cultivating the Orchard.

In cultivating an orchard the kind

of tool to use is of considerable con-

sequence.

It will rarely pay to use the com-

mon plow, as this is about sure to

break the roots, and deprive the

trees of large feeders. A common

plow may be used in a newly plant-

ed orchard where the trees have

made little root growth, but never

in a well established orchard.

Even in the case of a young

orchard, using the common plow year

after year will result in cutting of

many of the advancing roots, espe-

cially if the ground be hard below

the point in the soil yearly penet-

rated by the plow. On soil that is

light it does not matter so much as

the roots will tend to strike deeper

than the plow has reached. Ordinarily

it is best to cultivate orchards with
