## GENERAL NEWS

GATHERED FROM ALL PARTS OF  
THE WORLD.

A. F. Reames.

A. E. Reames, the democratic  
nominee for Congress in the First  
Congressional District, was born in  
Jacksonville, Or., in 1862. He  
comes from Southern stock, his  
father, Thomas G. Reames, having  
come to Oregon from Kentucky in  
the pioneer days of 1833, and his  
mother is a native of Missouri.

Evans Reames received his pri-  
mary education in the public schools  
of Jacksonville, and then attended  
the University of the Pacific, at San  
Jose, Cal. Later he was a student  
at the University of Oregon. Be-  
fore completing his course at Ore-  
gon's leading educational institu-  
tion Mr. Reames went to Lexing-  
ton, Va., and entered the law de-  
partment of Washington and Lee  
University. While there Reames  
won the debater's medal. He grad-  
uated from the law department of  
the Virginia institution in 1890, and  
immediately returned to Jackson-  
ville for the practice of his profes-  
sion. However, Mr. Reames re-  
mained in Jacksonville but a short  
time when he formed a partnership  
with E. H. Skipworth in Eugene.  
This lasted until 1895, when Reames  
moved to Portland and associated  
himself with C. M. Eldeman in the  
practice of law. In 1896 Reames re-  
turned to Jacksonville, where for a  
time he practiced law in partnership  
with Wm. M. Colvig, which part-  
nership was dissolved a short time  
ago.

A. E. Reames married Miss Edith  
Tongue in 1895. They have no chil-  
dren. Mr. Reames was for three  
years president of the Oregon Na-  
tive Sons Club of Jacksonville, and  
for one year held the office of grand  
president of the Native Sons of Ore-  
gon. He is a Shriner in the Maso-  
nic order, and belongs to the Red  
Men and the B. P. O. Elks.—Oregon-  
ian.

Strike is Illegal.

Chicago, April 10.—A dispatch to  
the Tribune from New York says:  
One of the most important legal de-  
cisions ever announced in the  
state on the right of a labor union to  
order a strike has just been handed  
down by the appellate division of  
the Supreme Court. It is in effect  
that a labor union has not the right  
to order its men to quit work where  
there is no attempt to employ non-  
union workers, but where the only  
question over which there is any  
difference is a refusal of the employ-  
er to recognize the union or its rep-  
resentatives.

The Prohibitionist's Nominate.

The Prohibitionists of the First  
Congressional district met in con-  
vention at Newberg Thursday after-  
noon and placed W. P. Elmore, of  
Brownsville in nomination for Con-  
gress. A strong prohibition plat-  
form was adopted and rousing  
speeches were made by Mrs. H. D.  
Harford, state president of the  
Women's Christian Temperance  
Union, Rev. H. Gould, Prof. R. W.  
Kelley and others. The sum of  
over \$150 was raised for the purpose  
of carrying on the campaign. The  
well-known Menzies quartet and  
Professor and Mrs. Lough, of the  
East, were present and furnished  
appropriate music for the occasion.

The N. P.'s Taxes.

The Weyerhaeuser Timber Com-  
pany Wednesday paid \$1962.21 taxes  
to Linn county. This is the property  
owned by the Northern Pacific  
and held under the name mentioned,  
being a part of the graft given the  
company in lieu of a lot of worth-  
less dirt and limbs up around Mt.  
Rainier.—Democrat.

SCIENCE AND INDUSTRY.

Germany has 3,200,000 goats and the  
United States only 1,800,000, whereas  
our number of sheep is 63,800,000, and  
Germany's only 9,700,000.

Vanadium, one of the rarer metals,  
has the property, mixed with copper,  
of allowing that metal to be drawn  
into very fine wire. Vanadium costs  
\$120 per pound.

The output of pig iron in Germany  
has risen 75 per cent. in the past 12  
years. During the same period the  
output of the United States has risen  
only 50 per cent., and is now nearly  
14,000,000 tons.

Peat gas has been employed as fuel  
at the Motals steel works, Sweden, for  
the past 20 years, originally for the  
puddling furnaces, and to a still greater  
extent, subsequently, for the open-  
hearth furnaces.

The aggregate tonnage of launches  
on the Clyde during the month of May  
constituted a record which has only  
been twice before exceeded in the  
whole history of Clyde shipbuilding.

Twenty-three steamers were launched,  
of a total of 54,000 tons; three large  
sailing ships, totaling 5,675 tons; two  
steam yachts, of a total of 405 tons,  
and six sailing yachts of an aggregate  
of 135 tons. The shipbuilding indus-  
try on the Clyde is remarkably pros-  
perous at the present time, and not-  
withstanding the above abnormal out-  
put of new vessels the berths are filled  
up with fresh orders amounting to  
about 50,000 tons.

A perpetual cloud of soot, gradually  
settling down, is known to overhang  
every large manufacturing city. To  
determine the amount of this wasteful  
dirt deposit in Manchester, England,  
Mr. W. Irwin weighed the solid matter  
obtained from a sample of snow that  
had been lying on the ground ten days,  
and has found an equivalent of 107  
pounds per acre or three tons  
per square mile. As the sam-  
ple represented the condition over at  
least 100 square miles, the chimneys of  
Manchester are convicted of throwing  
out not less than 300 tons of soot in ten  
days. Analysis showed 85 per cent.  
of carbon, 6.9 of heavy oil and grease,  
and 45.5 of ash, from which it appears  
that each day's 30 tons of soot is given
