A Gathering of the Important

Happenings of the Past Week.

Presented in Condensed Form. Most

Likely to Prove Interesting to Our

Many Readers.

How Hops Sell East.

The doings of the hop-buying

trust is very fully illustrated by a

letter Elmer Yarnell, of Mohawk,

received from the brewing firm into

whose hands a part, at least, of the

hops grown by Mr. Yarnell last season

fell. When biding his hops Mr.

Yarnell put notices into a few bales,

asking that the user notify him as to

date bought, price paid and how the

hops were used.

A letter from a Guelph, Canada,

brewery informs Mr. Yarnell that

his hops are very satisfactory, that

they were bought in February and

cost the brewing firm 32 cents a

pound, exclusive of the Canada

duty.

Mr. Yarnell sold his hops for 23

cents a pound, about the limit being

paid for hops in the Oregon market

in February. That would show a

difference of 9 cents a pound in favor

of the dealer. Allowing three cents

a pound for freight, insurance and

other charges the dealer cleared six

cents a pound, about \$1200, of the

thirteen thousand pounds of hops

grown by Mr. Yarnell in 1902. The

grower should have had the greater

part of the profit that fell into the

hands of the middlemen—Guard.

Texas Are Advertising.

Assistant General Passenger Agent

W. E. Cohan, of the Southern Pa-

cific, has received advanced copies

of the new illustrated folders from

Grants Pass and Eugene. Each of

these towns have planned for 50,000

copies of the books to be placed in

the hands of the advertising depart-

ment of the Harriman lines for dis-

tribution in the East. The Eugene

pamphlet was gotten out by the

Real Estate Exchange of that place

and the one for Grants Pass by the

Board of Trade.

Mr. Cohan expects to have the

first part of the edition ready to ship

East in a short time, as it is now

only a question of time before they

are received from the printers. Be-

sides these two places, Astoria, Al-

bama, Rockburg, Salem and Mc-

Minville have each issued a very

large edition to advertise their sec-

tions, and Corvallis, Independence

and Hillsboro have assured that

their pamphlets will be forthcoming

soon—Telegram, April 9th.

Scio too, Bro. Telegram. We will

soon have a 24 page illustrated pam-

phlet printed that will not be behind

the best of them.

Eighth Grade Examinations.

The following pupils of the Scio

Public Schools were successful in

the recent eighth grade county ex-

amination:

Langston Gill, Audie Shelton,

Marion Arnold, Cleo Johnson, Let-

gie M. Knight, V. E. Shelton and

Rollie Morris.

Five of this number passed in all

the branches required and received

diplomas. The others passed in

eight or more branches. The rules

prescribed by the State Board of Ed-

ucation, provide that if the appli-

cant passes in as many as eight

branches but not the full number,

he shall receive credit for the work

done and finish at the next exami-

nation. Otherwise, it is considered a

failure.

Ship sunk by Dewey.

Manila, April 13.—The warship

Reina Christina, the flagship of Ad-

miral Montero, which was sunk by

Admiral Dewey, was floated and

beached yesterday. The skeletons

of about 50 of her crew were found

in the hull.

One skeleton was evidently that of

an officer, for it had a sword by its

side. There are 15 shell holes in the

hull of the Reina Christina, one

made by an 8-inch and others small-

er. The main injection valve is

missing, showing the ship was scut-

tled when abandoned. The hull is

in fair condition.
