Vaccination as a Safeguard.

Commenting on the smallpox scourge in Eastern Oregon, Dr. Woods Hutchinson, state health officer, expressed this opinion regarding vaccination, which is concurred in by most of the medical profession:

"Vaccination is our only weapon against smallpox, either before or after exposure. Of those who have developed the disease, nine were unvaccinated and eight were vaccinated. Of the nine unvaccinated, six are already dead, and the other three are still in a precarious condition, after a hard fight for life. Of the eight vaccinated persons who contracted the disease, three had the disease in so mild a form as to be scarcely recognizable, two had moderate cases, and the others had six or more attacks, but not one was at any time in danger of his life."

"A grain parallel was afforded by the two ship-drivers Morgan and Prose. Morgan absolutely refused to be vaccinated, while Prose readily submitted. They developed symptoms within 24 hours of each other. Morgan died within eight days, an object of horror and loathing to every one who had to care for him. Prose had a marked type of the disease, but at no time was dangerously ill, and is now practically recovered."
