City Council.

Common Council, of the City of Scio, met in regular session May 7, 1903, in Firemen's Hall with Mayor L. E. Miller in the chair. Roll of officers called and those answering to their names were: R. Shelton, G. C. Johnston, R. B. Miller, G. F. Coffey, G. W. Morrow, W. A. Ewing and J. H. Stewart. Minutes of regular session of April 2, read and approved. Also minutes of special session of April 24, read and approved.

Report of committee on streets and public property read and on motion of W. A. Ewing was adopted, with instruction to City Marshal to execute petition of property owners in Portland Avenue asking for sidewalk, on motion request granted and Marshal instructed to see that work was built as per petition.

Petition of property owners along Main Street asking for the extension of Bicycles Limit, read and referred to committee on Streets and Public Property, and when council adjourned it adjourned to meet next Thursday evening for the further consideration of ordinances. Verbal report of committee on Streets and public property on petition of property owners in South Scio for grading and graveling certain streets—made that an agreement was reached with property owners along said streets whereby they agree to grade streets this year provided they may not be required to gravel until next year. On motion request adopted and petition and request granted.

Bill of A. W. Hagley for \$1.50 for soldering tank, read and on motion bill allowed and warrant ordered drawn on the treasury for the amount.

Bill of A. W. Hagley electrician, for \$30.00 salary for the month of April, read and on motion bill allowed and warrant ordered drawn on the treasury for the amount.

Bill of S. J. H. Hagley for printing, \$10.00, read and on motion referred to committee on Accounts and Current Expenses.

Bill of J. E. Cyrus for \$8 for work at plant, read and on motion bill allowed and warrant ordered drawn on the treasury for the amount.

Bill of J. E. Cyrus for \$71, read and committee on F. L. & W. reported bill paid and in the hands of the treasury. Bill allowed.

Bill of G. W. Phillips for \$30, water rent read and on motion bill was allowed and warrant ordered drawn on the treasury for the amount.

Bill of A. E. Blyden for \$1.35 for work on tower, read and on motion bill allowed and warrant ordered drawn on the treasury for the amount.

Bill of Albany Iron Works \$1.75 repairs and freight on pipe read and bill allowed and warrant ordered drawn on treasury for the amount.

Bill of E. C. Peery \$15.10 for supplies read and on motion referred to committee F. L. & W.

Bill of A. G. Prill \$1.50 postage health notices read and on motion bill allowed and warrant ordered drawn on the treasury for the amount.

Bill of W. H. Stem for \$2, labor on shed read and referred to the com. on Fire, L. & W.

Bill of Mitchell Lewis Staver Co. for \$12.75 read Belting and on motion bill allowed and ordered paid.

Notice from com. of Board of Health read requesting City to clean up around tower and hall.

On motion Marshal was instructed to procure 2 cords of big fir 16-inch wood for City Hall. On motion com on streets and public property instructed to build water closet at city hall.

Verbal statement from V. Chadek in regard to his arrest and fine on the charge of allowing minors in his saloon, asking City to refund the amount of \$48, both fines and costs. The request was laid over for further consideration and Recorder instructed to ascertain if possible the age of young Craft and report next Thursday evening.

Council adjourned.

Fierce Bear Fight.

Bateman followed and found himself up against a big black bear and her cub.
