Loses the Springs.

Thursday evening's Telegram

gives an extended account of the

reversal of the decision in the case of

Chief Mansfield's ownership of the

famous Breitenbach hot springs,

of which he has had possession for

ten or more years. The court

makes the following very sweeping

findings:

"It is shown that the entryman

resided at different periods during the

time claimed as continuously resid-

ing on the land, at Mill City, Albany,

and in Idaho. It is also satisfactorily

shown that his wife made only

occasional visits to the land; in fact,

there is little set forth in the evi-

dence to indicate that his residence

upon the lands was other than that

of many others who came there each

year for the purpose of using the wa-

ter. It is not shown that the entry-

man ever resided upon the land. In

good faith and with the apparent in-

tention of making it a home, he as-

sumed no control or anything rela-

tive to the same. These springs

seems to have been used by the gen-

eral public ever since they were dis-

covered. It is shown that a large

part of the improvements on the

land and the trail leading to same

were made by those persons and not

by the entryman. His continuous

residence was a mere pretense; his

entry appears not to have been made

in good faith and for a home but for

the purpose of profit and specula-

tion."

Parities familiar with the history

of the case know that few home-

steads have ever been taken up in

which the entryman actually lived

on the property as much as Mans-

field has on this property, in fact

doing so at a sacrifice for many years.

taken from Mansfield for the reason

given them hardly a homesteader in

the valley can hold his claim.
