Births Must Be Recorded.

It is necessary now to make official
record of every birth and every
death. A new law that is already
in effect requires every physician,
midwife or head of the family to
give notice by the end of the month
to the county health officer of any
birth that occurs under his or her
charge. Every physician, midwife
or head of family must give notice
to such health officer within 18 days
of every death. No burial can take
place until a proper burial certificate
has been made out and transmitted
to the county health officer.

All these requirements are the re-
sult of the act creating the state
board of health, which passed the
last legislature. It contained an
emergency clause and took effect on
its approval by the governor. It
creates a county, as well as a state
health board. The county board is
the county judge and county physi-
cian.

To this officer must be reported all
infectious diseases, deaths, and
causes thereof, places of burial of
every person that dies in the county,
and in the case of birth of any child
give name of parents, residence and
occupation.

Power is given the county board
of health to quarantine against in-
fectious diseases in other county or
counties of the state to quarantine
any case or cases of infectious dis-
eases within the county, and to call
upon all police officers, sheriffs and
constables to enforce such quaran-
tine. All cases of birth, death, bur-
ial and infectious diseases are re-
ported by the county health officer to
the secretary of the state board of
health, where a complete record is kept.

The new law will add materially
to the duties of the county judge, all
physicians and others. The penalty
for violation of the law is a fine of
not less than \$10 nor more than \$100.

Sensational Shooting Affray.

Mrs. Maxfield attempted to kill
Otto Hall, who recently eloped from
this city with her daughter, Char-
lotte Maxfield, at the corner of Sec-
ond and Baker streets, about 7:30
o'clock Wednesday evening. Hall
and Miss Maxfield had been married
near Vancouver, Wash., and had
just returned to this city and were
on their way to the home of some
friends when Mrs. Maxfield met
them. After vainly endeavoring to
persuade her daughter to leave Hall
and go with her, Mrs. Maxfield
pointed a revolver directly at Hall
and fired. She was standing only a
few feet away and the pistol was
aimed straight at Hall's trousers
and another bullet directly beneath
it, thus causing it to glance and sav-
ing his life. The glancing bullet,
although checked by contact with
the buttons, struck Hall with suffi-
cient force to inflict a very painful
but not serious wound on the ab-
domen, but not penetrating entirely
through the skin.

After the first shot had been fired
Hall started to run while Mrs. Max-
field fired five more times at him.
One of the bullets entered a window
of the residence of Mrs. Saltmarsh.
Some of Hall's friends seized Mrs.
Maxfield and disarmed her. She
was then arrested and soon after
placed in the county jail.

Hall was taken to the office of Dr.
Hall where his wound was dressed
and he was then taken to the resi-
dence of Mr. and Mrs. William
Rainwater, in East Albany. His
young wife is with him and says she
will remain with him and not return
to her mother.—Herald.

Troops Called Out.

Jackson, Ky., May 24. A battalion
of troops numbering 120 men, with a
Gatling gun, arrived here this after-
noon to preserve order in the town
and about the courthouse during the
investigation of the assassination of
James B. Marcus, the last victim of
the Hargis-Cockrell feud. The troops
arrived on a special train from
Lexington and at once pitched
camp near the center of town.
