## POWERFUL CHINESE MEDICINES

One Dose of a Celestial Compound

Can Safely Be Warranted to

Kill or Cure.

"I have always heard that Chinese

medicines are very powerful," said

the city astronomer, "but I never had

any idea what a tremendous effect

they were capable of producing on the

system till I saw a Doyers street

thugman take a pill the other day,

and then I realized that one dose of

a celestial compound can safely be

warranted to kill or cure," says a New

York exchange. "Never in my born

days did I see such a pill. How on

earth the fellow ever got it down is

a mystery. It was fully as big as a

pigeon's egg, and, so the patient told

me afterward, fearfully bitter. Upon

inquiry I found that that was a fair

sample of most Chinese remedies. No

matter what the nature of the medi-

cine, it is generally made up into

enormous pills, whose naturally bad

taste is modified by nothing but a

little licorice. These pills are in-

cluded in wax capsules which preserve them

from the air and keep them from

being broken to pieces before their

time. Aside from the pills the only

remedies used by orthodox Chinese

in New York are a medicinal oil

which they rub on the temples to

cure headaches, and a liquid made by

boiling down the leaves, stems, and

roots of certain plants in a quantity

of drinking water. According to my

Doyers street authority, this fluid

medicine is even worse than the pills,

for it has to be cooked till it is al-

most like a sirup and drunk scalding

hot."

## FEATS OF CHICKEN FANCIERS.

By Intelligent Breeding They Have

Produced Fowls of All Sizes

and Colors.

The American Standard of Perfection

as drafted and copyrighted by the

American Poultry association, con-

siders the names of 116 varieties of

fowls, 115 of which are due to the

development of men. God made only

Intelligent breeding fanciers have

produced fowls, of all sizes, from the

diminutive bantam to the mammoth

broiler turkey, one a tiny bit of feath-

much as a half-grown boy. Besides

equally wonderful have been accom-

plished in color effects. There are

varieties in red, black, brown and

white, with nearly all possible com-

binations, besides buff and Andalusian

blue. The fanciers have shown that

they can live, stripe, spangle or bar

the feathers of their birds in any way

to satisfy their individual fancy. In

fact, about all they have left untried

is to put their initials on the feathers

of their birds.

## POLAR BEARS EASILY TAKEN.

With the Modern Repeating Rifle the

Greatest Animals Are Killed

Without Danger.

The animal par excellence, which

the hunter, the amateur Arctic trav-

eler and the young explorer hopes

and dreams of killing, is the polar

bear, writes Com. Robert E. Peery,

in Leslie's Monthly. The reason for

this is the magnificent trophy which

the great white skin makes. This

feeling was no less strong centuries

ago than it is now, for we read that

one of the early Icelandic sea rovers

to Greenland quarreled with and

killed his bosom companion because

he had slain a large bear, instead of

leaving that honor to his chief. With

the modern repeating rifle the bear

stands no chance against the hunter,

no matter under what conditions they

may meet, and if it is hunted in the

safer way, with the assistance of

dogs, there is hardly more excite-

ment than in killing musk-oxen, ex-

cept for the wild, helters-skelter dash

over the ice to overtake the animal,

after the dogs strike the hot scent.

An Up-to-Date Shave.

The antiseptic shaving saloon is the

latest achievement in hygiene select-

ed by Tit-bits. The victim is seated in

an enameled iron chair, with his neck

and shoulders enveloped in a rubber

pad that has been dipped in an anti-

septic solution. Previously the razor-

soap dish, and brush have been steri-

lized by half an hour's hard boiling.

Nothing is allowed to touch the face

that has not been either sterilized or

disinfected antiseptically. Even the

finger tips of the operator are dipped

in a solution. Taps are turned by the

foot, and the drawers where towels

are kept are likewise proof.
