The banking firm of T. J. Munkers has been incorporated, T. J. Munkers, W. A. Ewing and R. Shelton being the incorporators. Articles of incorporation were filed with the Secretary of State Wednesday.

The telephone line to Jordan is now well under way, and in the course of two weeks will be completed. It is very likely that farmers' lines will be constructed all through the Jordan country. One to Larwood is an assured fact. The farmers will put in the line themselves after which the cost to them will be only fifty cents per month. It is also very probable that another line will be run to the Coeske Neck section. These lines will more than repay the user in the saving of time and trouble, and in the winter time will be a great convenience. Scio is keeping in line with six wire 'phones to be installed this week.

**Hermann Elected.**  
The returns indicate that Huger Hermann has been elected congressman of the first district by 1509 to 2000 plurality, carrying every county but Clark County, with 400 for Reames, Jackson 189, Josephine 200 and Polk 16. Douglas gives Hermann the most 430 and big majorities are given by the coast counties. Lane presents him with about 250. The vote is short in the whole district 30 or 40 per cent.

In passing around contracts for government transportation to the Philippines, the War Department has again ignored Portland, but accepted proposals from Puget Sound and San Francisco, at the identical rate quoted by Laidlaw & Co., of Portland.

The state law on trusts is to be tested. W. E. Jenkins, a contractor in Portland, has begun suit against the lumber firms of that city, known as Inman, Poulson Co., Day Lumber Co., North Pacific Co., Eastern and Western Lumber Co., Portland Lumber Co., and the Jones Lumber Co., which, he declares, have formed an unlawful combination in restraint of trade. He claims that these companies discriminate against him in selling lumber and fixing prices.

**Notice to Dog Owners.**  
The City Recorder has placed in my hands a list of those persons living in Scio who own dogs and have not paid license on them. Ordinance No. 40 reads as follows: Any person failing to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof before the City Recorder shall be fined in any sum not less than four nor more than twenty dollars. And any person owning dogs and keeping the same in town who hasn't paid their dog license will be promptly prosecuted after the first day of June, 1903. Pay up and save costs.

**Notice to Bicycle Riders.**  
It shall be unlawful for any person or persons during the months of April, May, June, July, August, September and October in each year to use any sidewalk or crosswalk, except to cross over a crosswalk, within the corporate limits of the city of Scio by riding a bicycle, tricycle or tandem of any kind thereon during said months. **INDUSTRIAL INFORMATION.**  
One of the largest sewing machine plants in the country is to be immediately erected on Long Island.

A new fast train has been put on to shorten the time between Chicago and San Francisco by three hours and ten minutes.

Boston has a waterworks that could supply over 1,000,000 gallons daily, but the consumption is only 55,000,000, or 116 gallons per capita.

The drift of the times is in the direction of putting the locomotive power in the end of a car in small compartments instead of 100 to 150 tons of steel at the front end of a train.

Among the grand railroad schemes now arousing the attention of grain shippers and importers abroad is one proposed to lay a line from British and Port Arthur and deliver it at Leith, Scotland. Eight steel boats of large capacity will be built at Port Arthur and a 2,500-horse power at present, 3,500 men are engaged and the work is to be done by May 1, 1904.

**WEALTH OF INDIANA FARMS.**  
State Makes Good Showing from an Agricultural Point of View According to Census Statistics.

The census bureau has issued a bulletin giving the final agricultural statistics of Indiana. It shows that the 22,157 farms enumerated in Indiana on June 1, 1900, were valued at \$541,735,340, of which \$2 per cent represents the land and improvements thereon other than buildings. The value of farm implements and machinery was \$27,330,370, and of live stock \$109,358,751.

These make the total value of farm property \$778,524,471. The total value of farm products in 1899 was \$204,430,196, of which 40 per cent was in animal products and 60 per cent in crops, including forest products. The total value of farm products exceeded the total for 1899 by 116 per cent. The gross farm income of Indiana for 1899 was \$15,980,798 and the gross income upon investment 18 per cent.
