Indianapolis, May 24.—The American Society of Equity tomorrow will issue a bulletin to the farmers of the United States demanding an increase in the price of wheat, giving arguments that the minimum price should be \$1, and urging the farmers of the United States not to sell for less than \$1.

The society has been organized, with this city as national headquarters, for the purpose of maintaining higher prices for farm products by cooperation of farmers of the country, and this is the first formal demand for an increase in prices as the result of the combination.
