Will Reach 400.

HEPPNER, via telephone to The
Dailies, June 16.—According to the
most reliable estimates obtainable
here at 2 o'clock this afternoon, the
total number of lives lost in and
near Heppner will be about 400.

More than 100 bodies have been
identified and buried. Many more
are so distorted and blackened that
identification is impossible. There
was some plundering of the ruins
Sunday night and yesterday, but a
large force of deputy sheriffs has
been sworn in, and the ghoul has
ceased open actions. Homeless
people crowd every available house,
and tents have been provided for
many. There is great need of pro-
visions and blankets.

CLOUD BURST
AT HEPPNER

Over Three Hundred Were

Drowned In Willow

Creek.

FLOOD CAME WITHOUT WARNING

Business Part of the Town Swept

Away by the Raging Wall

Of Water.

Property Loss Is Heavy.

SPOKANE, WASH., June 15.—A

mighty wall of water rushed down

the Valley of Willow Creek, about

5:30 p. m. yesterday and swept

through the town of Heppner, Or.,

dealing death and destruction. The

dead are estimated to number from

350 to 500. The property loss is

placed at \$1,000,000. Heppner is

situated in the narrow valley of

Willow Creek.

A great storm was raging yester-

day afternoon. About 5:30 o'clock a

cloud burst occurred a short distance

above Heppner, and a wall of water

like the Columbia River rushed

down the Valley. The roar of the

water drowned the roar of the

storm, and the people had no warn-

ing of the oncoming flood. Sudden-

ly it rushed through the town,

sweeping houses from their founda-

tion and drowning the people in the

wreck of their own homes. The

dead bodies and wreckage were

borne down the valley. Scores are

still unaccounted for. 190 bodies

have been recovered and buried.

No. 6 Killed at Lexington.

At Lexington most of the houses

were wrecked but no one was

drowned. At lone one house was

wrecked. The railway, telegraph

and telephone lines were badly dam-

aged in the Valley.

The flood at Heppner subsided

quickly. It is found that the resi-

dence district suffered most, though

the business section was flooded.

The Portland office of the O. R. &

N. this afternoon received the fol-

lowing message from Heppner, via

Echo:

"Terrible tidal wave 15 feet high,

swept down Willow creek last night

destroying almost the entire town.

Loss of life terrible."

"Roughly estimated almost all

the people living on the banks of

Willow Creek were drowned.

"Need relief in shape of large

body of men to help clear away de-

bris and recover bodies. Haste is

very essential, as the weather is

turning warm and the bodies must

be recovered before putrefaction sets

in.

GENERAL NEWS LAND FOR SALE.

GATHERED FROM ALL PARTS OF
THE WORLD.

A Gathering of the Important Hap-

penas of the Past Week. Pre-

Secretary of State Dunbar has

received 98 vouchers for claims of

Indian War Veterans and is issuing

warrants in payment of same. It

prunes and other fruits, the second

to the bins and the top floor to grad-

ing fruit. There will also be several
