**Obituary.**

Jane Reed was born in Crawford County, Missouri, February 6th, 1821, died in Scio, Oregon, June 12, 1903, at the age of 82 years, 4 months and 6 days. She was the wife of W. Bilyeu at the age of 16 years in Crawford County, Missouri, and 7 children were born to them in Missouri, 3 girls and 4 boys, and 2 of the girls died at the age of 2 and 4 years. In the spring of 1852 inspired by the flattering reports of the great far western country, and having a desire to better their conditions financially in this life, with a train of about 100 wagons, with ox teams, and as many as 1000 head of hardy and brave men, and knowing the trials, toils and difficulties that would befall them on their journey, they started out with their small children, to travel a distance of 3000 miles over a wild and desolate country, which was only inhabited by wild Indians and wild beasts. They were frequently attacked by Indians on the journey, but being a large train well armed with rifles and well arranged the Indians were repelled when they made an attack on the train, with the loss of only one man and after the 3000 mile journey which took 6 months and 10 days they succeeded in reaching the Garden of Eden, the garden spot of the world, the great Willamette Valley which was their objective point and settled on a Donation by Land Claim, in what is known far and wide as the Bilyeu Ben, situated in the forks of the Santiam river in Linn County, Oregon, and upon said Donation they resided for 37 years, and during that time there were born to them 8 more children 4 boys and 4 girls, and of these children 11 survive them, and the health of the family was such that during 35 years of their residence on their Donation Claim that the service of a physician was not necessary.

During Mrs. Bilyeu's younger life she made a profession of Christianity and joined the Missionary Baptist church in Missouri, in which faith she always upheld through life and lived an upright and honorable life. She was a true, kind, loving, patient, and grand-mother, neighbor and friend and always gave her kind words and assistance to those in sickness, distress and trouble and many have been blessed by her acts of love and kindness.

She was a cripple during the last 15 years and could only walk by the use of a crutch or chair, but she bore all this with patience and love, and now the dear one to us all, Mother, has passed away from her earthly trials and troubles and has gone home to rest, and if dear mother was here today she would say "Dear children and neighbors live good, true lives."

Thus we lay to rest one of the sturdy old pioneers of '52 and may peace and rest abide with her forever.
