Cyclones on the French Island of
Tonquin caused 150 deaths.

Colonel R. S. Oliver, of Albany, N. Y.,
has been appointed to succeed Sanger
as assistant secretary of war.

A score or more of Christian
Endeavors were injured by wind wrecking
the big concrete tent at Denver.

The Dublin council has voted not to

DEATH ENDS EXCURSION.

Fast Train Crashes Into Trainload of
Negroes With Fatal Results.

Kansas City, Mo., July 15.—Missouri
Pacific fast mail No. 7, which left
St. Louis at 3 o'clock this morning for
Kansas City, crashed into an excursion
south bound from Kansas City, that
had become stalled at "Dead Man's
Curve" between Little Rock and Lee
Summit, at 10:25 this morning. Three
persons were killed, two of them
tramps, and 50 were injured. With
the exception of one or two of the crew
on the fast mail, all the injured were
on the excursion train. Most of them
were Kansas City negroes. Eighteen
were seriously hurt. The injuries of
the excursion train were of cuts and bruises.
None of the passengers on the fast mail
were hurt.

The engines, the mail and baggage
cars on the fast mail went down an embankment,
but the rest of that train remained
upright, as did the excursion
train. Only the engine, one baggage
car and a mail car on the fast mail left
the track.

Responsibility for the wreck seems
to rest with the engineer of the fast
mail, who failed to stop promptly when
flagged. The engine on the excursion
train, which consisted of 12 coaches
heavily loaded, broke down. A flagman
was sent ahead to stop the fast mail
then about five. The engineer of the
fast mail failed to see the foreman
flagman and only slackened up when
warned by the second man, who was
within a short distance of the excursion
train. The fast mail was running
at a high rate of speed and it was
unable to come to a full stop. When the
fast mail struck, it was making 15
miles an hour. The engine, the baggage
car and the foremost mail car left
the track and rolled down the embankment.
The impact badly damaged the
engine and baggage car of the excursion
train, but the cars remained upright.

IDAHO LANDS ARE WITHDRAWN.

Geological Survey Will Pass on Their
Worth for Irrigation.

Washington, July 15.—The secretary
of the interior today authorized the
temporary withdrawal from all entry of
three tracts of about 5,000 acres each,
lying in the Blackfoot land district,
Idaho, with a view to examination to
determine their desirability as reserve
sites. The first is known as the Henry
lake reserve site. It lies in the north-
east extremity of Fremont county and
embraces the whole of Lake Henry.
The second proposed reserve lies 20
miles to the south, and is known as
the island lake reserve site, while the
third, Flat Rock reserve site, lies be-
tween the two named.

The geological survey, upon whose
recommendation the withdrawal is
made, is examining to determine the
feasibility of the reclamation scheme
in Fremont county, Idaho, the propo-
sition being to store water in a series
of natural reservoirs. These examina-
tions will continue through the summer.

RIDE FOR LIFE ON CAR.

Fifteen People Escape From Fire Jump
Into a Subway Excavation.

New York, July 15.—Fifteen persons
have been hurt by falling into the sub-
way excavation at Lexington avenue and
One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street,
after jumping from a burning trolley
car, on which they had a thrilling ride
for several blocks, while the motorman
was making desperate attempts to reach
a fire engine house. The car was filled
with about 80 passengers, mostly women
and children. When they discovered
the fire many tried to jump, but the
motorman put his foot on the brakes
and the car came to a stop. The car
was enveloped in flames.

The conductor saw that there was
danger of burning the whole carload of
passengers and rang the bell. The car
came to a stop right over the excavation
for the subway. The passengers
piled off on top of one another. The
planking over the hole collapsed and
about 25 persons were carried down.
Those on the bottom were severely
bruised, but only one was in a serious
condition.

To inspect the Keenawage.

Fortmon, Eng. July 15.—The
Prince of Wales arrived this evening
for the inspection of Read-Admiral
Cotton's flagship Keenawage. Amba-
sador Choate and secretary White
traveled in the same train from London.
Admiral Charles F. Hotham re-
ceived them at the station and the
whole party drove to the Admiralty
house as the Admiral's guests. H. O.
Arnold-Foster, parliamentary secretary
to the admiralty, and other depart-
mental officials have also arrived from
London for tomorrow's inspections.

War in the Balkans.

Paris, July 15.—According to a dis-
patch from Constantinople published
here, engagements have taken place be-
tween Turkish and Bulgarian troops on
the frontier, which the Turks accuse
the Bulgarians of crossing. On the
other hand the Bulgarians assert that
Turks tried to occupy the neutral zone.
The dispatch adds that a ministerial
council was hurriedly summoned at
the Yildiz Kiosk last night and
more troops have been called.

For Cuban Loan.

Havana, July 15.—President Palma
sent a message to congress recommend-
ing the appointment of a member of
each house to act with an appointee
of the executive commission to pre-
pare a bill to the United States and negotiate
the \$35,000,000 loan. The senate held
an extended session this evening but
did not reach the matter of the ratifica-
tion of the United States naval station
treaty.

HAPPENINGS HERE IN OREGON

SAVE MONEY ON LIGHTNING.

New Bid for State Institutions Shows
Great Reduction.

The state board of capital building
commissioners have opened bids for
electric lighting for the state institu-
tions located here—the statehouse
prison, asylum and blind school.
Only one bid was presented, that of
the Salem light and traction company,
which holds the present contract. The
proposals were for either meter or flat
rate payments for all or part of the
institutions, and for four or ten years
so that the terms offered are not easily
stated, but members of the board
say that the rates offered are about
30 per cent less than the state has
been paying.

The different plans proposed will be
submitted to the state engineer, C. C.
Lewis, who will advise the board
which plan of lighting is most advan-
tageous to the state. The state owns
a 150-horsepower water right at the
penitentiary, which can be used for
about half the lighting if found ad-
visable. Under the new contract the
state will save some \$4000 a year.

BIG PLACER ENTERPRISE.

Rogue River Ground to Be Worked by
Means of Dredging.

A gigantic placer mining enterprise
that undertaken by the Bannock
Gold Dredging Company, composed of
Montana and Chicago capitalists. Po-
tential consideration of \$35,000 this company
has bonded nearly all of the place-
ments of the Lower Rogue River, Ore-
gon, and extending along Rogue
river for a distance of several miles
between 700 and 800 acres of place-
ground have been bonded by the Ban-
nock company. They are preparing
to work the ground by dredging and
will use a machine of their own manu-
facture. They have had experts ex-
amine the field for several months past, and
a thorough prospect of the ground has
been made. The gravel of the creek
bed and of the bars along either side
carry high values in gold.

Land Buyers in the Air.

The announcement a few days ago
that the secretary of the interior had
disapproved a number of "clear lists"
in Oregon land selections, discloses
something entirely new in the land
matters in Oregon. None of the state
and office attaches have ever before
heard of a clear list being disapproved.
This unusual action on the part of the
secretary of the interior is conclusively
proof, if any further proof is neces-
sary, that all Oregon land matters are
to be scrutinized with utmost care.
The disapproval of these clear lists
occasioned no small surprise, though
the action is entirely in accordance
with the rules of practice in the de-
partment of the interior.

Rich Ledge Uncovered.

A new and important strike has
been made in the Waldo district by
Charles Wimer and William Ross, of
Grant's Pass. A wide ledge, carry-
ing values in both copper and gold
has been uncovered. Samples of ore
from the new find are attracting much
attention. The predominating value
is copper, though there is a consid-
erable showing of gold. The mal-
value of the find is in its extent. Out-
croppings show the vein to be of great
length and many hundred feet in
width. It will be developed and ex-
plored. It lies on the same belt as
does the copper mines of Prestor
Peak and Iron Mountain, California.

Rain Ruins Cherry Crop.

The continued rains of last week
practically ruined the cherry crop in
Clackamas county. The Royal Anne
variety, of which there was an abun-
dant crop, has been rendered unmar-
ketable. The fruit has cracked badly and
is now fermenting on the trees. If
the rain does not cease soon extensive
damage will result to hay and grain
throughout the county. With a change
to favorable weather, Clackamas coun-
ty will this year yet harvest one of the
most bountiful crops that was ever
raised.

Receipts of Land Office.

Clerk of the State Land Board, G.
G. Brown, has compiled his monthly
statement of the receipts of his office
during June, showing that a total of
\$26,271.94 had been received from the
different sources, such as land sales,
payments on certificates, etc. and
turned over to the Treasurer. Of the
total amount \$18,925.61 was received
as payments on certificates and cash
sale of school lands.

Must Not Set Fires.

In accordance with sections 1727,
1728, 1729, 1730, 1791 and 1792 of Be-
llinger and Cotton's annotated code
and statutes of Oregon, Governor
Chamberlain has issued his annual
proclamation referring to the protec-
tion of timber and other property
from fire. The law provides that this
proclamation shall be issued by the
governor on or before the first day
of July of each year.

More Inmate Patients in June.

The monthly report of the superin-
tendent of the state insane asylum for
June shows an increase in the number
of patients from 1202 to 1214 during
the month. The per capita cost of
maintenance was \$10.43 per month,
or 34 cents a day. The general health
of the patients has been good.

Clark is Satisfied With Southern Oregon
Copper Ledge.

Developments at the copper mines
on Joe's creek known as the Blue
ledge, are continuing under the man-
agement of Patry Clark. It is reported
upon reliable authority that the pros-
pects obtained from the use of the
diamond drill in the mine are showing
up more flatteringly every day. It is
now practically certain that the prop-
erty will be taken by Clark under the
provisions of the bond which he has
obtained, and that the deal will be
closed before the termination of the
term for which the bond was given.
Prominent mining men from all sec-
tions of the Northwest are flocking
to that section looking into the pros-
pects around the mine. The mine
bonded by Clark is not the only one
in this vicinity which is making good
mineral showings. The belt of copper-
bearing ore reaches for miles north
and south from the Blue ledge, and the
bonding of the Blue ledge to Clark has
given an impetus to the development
of other copper prospects in this re-
gion. That that vicinity will prove
to be one of the great mining centers
of the Northwest is now confidently
expected.

Assistant in Treasurer's Office.

State Treasurer Moore has appoint-
ed George G. Gans, Jr., to assist in his
office temporarily on account of the
increase of work due to the collection
of the corporation taxes. Mr. Gans
was formerly a clerk in the land de-
partment. The last legislature made
an additional appropriation for cler-
ical assistance in the treasury depart-
ment because of work incident to the
collection of the inheritance and corpo-
ration taxes and a permanent appoint-
ment under this authority will be made
later.

Packing Marion County Cherries.

The Salem fruit cannery is having
a very satisfactory run on cherries,
and manager Holcomb says that the
total pack of this fruit will amount to
about 8000 cases. Early soft cherries
were not of first-class quality, owing to
an overabundance of water in them,
but they will keep well. The cherry
crop as a whole has been of fair qual-
ity and the quantity is large as was ex-
pected. The cannery employs
