EDITORIAL.

With more than ten weeks of the new grain season passed, not a single grain ship has cleared from Puget Sound and but three have cleared from Portland. This extraordinary condition of affairs is due to the exorbitant prices demanded by the farmers of the Northwest, it being impossible for exporters to handle wheat except at a loss. Meanwhile the steady offerings of Pacific coast wheat in Europe have caused a demand for increased supplies from other directions, and last week the Danubian ports shipped 2,000,000 bushels and Russia shipped 3,000,000 bushels. Not until the liberal stock of those countries and of India and the Argentine's new crop, which will be available within about ninety days, is large much lower prices are probable. Dollar wheat would be a great thing for this country, but it would hardly be reached unless some of the foreigners can be induced to cease filling the European demand on a parity of 75 cents per bushel of the foreigner's wheat. The consent of some foreign nations is still necessary for the successful carrying out of some desirable projects—Oregonian.

They Hold Till January.

Ever since the enactment by the last legislature of a law requiring road supervisors to be appointed by the county board and commissioners there has been more or less difference of opinion as to the status of supervisors elected last year. The new law provides that new supervisors shall be appointed by the court in January, 1904. Some persons in various parts of the state contended that the supervisors elected last year went out of office as soon as the new law became effective, which was last May. Others held that such supervisors continued in office until January, 1904.

In Polk county the difference of opinion ended in a lawsuit to determine the question. Judge Boise decided the question in the circuit court at Dallas, holding that supervisors elected last year would continue in office until January, 1904 when all should be replaced by supervisors appointed by the county court.

The directors of the Lewis and Clark Exposition for Portland have decided upon \$70,000 as the sum needed from the general government, and Senators Mitchell and Fulton, together with Representative Williamson and Herron, will ask congress for that amount. Of this amount \$100,000 is for an Alaskan exhibit, \$100,000 for a Hawaiian and Philippine exhibit and \$500,000 for general purposes.
