When he went to get the money this morning it was gone and there was no clue to the identity of the thief.

The last day for paying taxes on this year's roll is fast approaching. On the morning of October 6th penalty and interest will be charged. That means in order to avoid the penalty all taxes must be paid by October 5th. A considerable number of people have paid half their taxes and are taking all the grace

allowed under the law for liquidation of the balance. If their last half is not paid by the evening of October 5th, they will be compelled on the following morning to pay 10 per cent penalty on the last half and 12 per cent interest on the same amount from April 7th to date of payment.

About fifty holders of timber claims in Crook, Klamath and Lake counties met at the hall of No. 24 fire company last night and organized a pool. An agreement was entered into between the claimants that all will hold together and not sell. No definite price was set but several declared they would not sell for less than \$2000. The offer has been about one half of that amount and a good many have let go rather than run the risk of having to hold for several years. The timber is yellow and sugar pine and scales from 2,000,000 to 3,000,000 feet per claim.—Herald.

Tuesday of this week as Wm. Brenner was coming home from the country he was met by Mr. Wallace who resides just outside the city limits, came running out and told him a bear was in their garden. He immediately secured a rifle. Wm. went after brim's scap and after running him a couple of miles with the aid of several dogs he secured it. His bearship disdained to climb a tree as bears usually do when pursued by dogs, but he was no common black bear but a brown one weighing exactly 300 pounds. Mr. Brenner took the hide to Portland Wednesday and will have it mounted.

The question is before the council as to the advisability of purchasing an engine with which to furnish the power necessary to operate the light and water works. For the past year this service has been of the poorest kind, in fact it has been in working order about one-third of the time, all the trouble being the want of power. If an engine was purchased it would be the best thing to have for the power necessary to run the plant provided the council would move the plant to its present place. The council has not as yet decided what course to pursue, but we can expect to see it in the near future.

One day last week, Dick Horner, as he is commonly known, pilfered a watch from the jewelry establishment of A. W. Hagey and offered to sell it at a different place in the city, by which means the theft was discovered, and after a lively chase he was captured by marshal Bilyeu.

Being taken into custody Justice Shelton he was held to answer before the grand jury and was taken to Albany and lodged in the county jail the same evening. He seems to have a mania for stealing watches as he has served one or two terms in the penitentiary for the same offense. Although the amount of the watch had indeed may have been in some degree responsible for his last act. He is a half breed and his home is near Dayton.

School opens next Monday morning and it is incumbent upon the parents to see that their children enter the first day and remain until the last. This cannot be to strongly emphasized and immediately to be to the work in hand. Any one entering later, unless far in advance of their fellow classmates, or who enter at the beginning, rather than wait until they become the required age, and thus avoid creating new classes in the middle a school year.

Eugene Bosse, manager of the Salem flax mills, arrived in Scio Friday last and has since been busy looking to the care of the flax in this section, having purchased the same of E. R. Drury. Although arrangements have not been completed yet, it is Mr. Bosse's intention to operate the mill here the coming year, having purchased plenty of flax to insure a good year's run. Mr. Bosse informs us that the flax industry in this section is well in its infancy, and that the company of which he is stockholder, will in a short time have four mills in operation, the Scio and Salem mills, one at Albany and one at Woodburn. A factory will then be built in the neighborhood of these mills which will use the product of these mills in the manufacture of linen and other material for which flax fibre and tow are used.
