EDITORIAL.

The Oregonian's Washington correspondent in writing of the land office matters in Oregon, says: The charge has been made that Receiver Booth at Roseburg, has furnished the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company with "inside information" which has enabled it to get control of large areas of valuable public timber lands, and the charges are now being investigated. If sustained, they will make it incumbent upon the delegation to name a new man for Booth's place. The retention of Bridges and Newell is a question that will be left to the delegation to decide. There is no particular reason for haste in these cases, however, and these three appointments will likely remain to be made after Congress meets.

The newspapers and citizens of Josephine county are making loud protestations against the proposed reserve in that locality claiming that the authorities at Washington have it in for Oregon; that the present reserve is sufficient for the conserving of the rainfall; and that the forest reserve of Oregon is to be used principally for a deer park. Our delegation in congress will certainly look into the matter and will work vigorously against any move on the Secretary's part which would tend to retard the progress and development of Oregon.

Seldom has a brief dispatch told a sadder story than that which recorded the drowning of George Quinn, Monday on the steamer Oregon. On her recent trip from Nome to Seattle "He had been suffering with delirium tremens for three days crawled through a porthole and jumped into the sea." How few words it takes to tell the sequel to a wretched life! Yet what chapters might be written of the circumstances, the struggles, the sufferings that preceded the end! Of parental hopes blasted, of temptations rudely or thoughtlessly thrown in the way of the young man or cruelly pressed upon him in the earlier period of his terrible downfall!—Oregonian.

An idea of the way sheep are pouring into the Eastern market may be

gained from a statement made by the Oregon Short Line and the Denver & Rio Grande railways at Salt Lake. They say that the two roads are moving 110 cars a day, and allowing the Union Pacific one-third of such a number, it would be seen that are now going into market almost half a million head a month. And there are a "few" more to follow.

Mansfield Wins.

A telephone message from Portland lacked by the Oregonian, announced that the case of S. B. Ormsby, agt. Claud Mansfield, has been decided by the secretary of the Interior in favor of Mansfield, which will give him a permanent title to the famous hot springs on the Breiten bush.

Mansfield first went into the springs in 1888, taking up his claim, and probably no one in Albany has more faithfully complied with the law than did Mansfield in the following years. Then about five years ago an effort was begun to secure the reversion of the claim to the forest reserve established in the Cascades, in which the springs are located. The case was decided by the land office at Oregon City in favor of Mansfield, when it was appealed to the U. S. land office at Washington, and was decided by the commissioner Richards in favor of the complainant. An appeal was immediately taken to the Interior Department, with the result stated.

In connection with the case Hui, J. T. Mitchell appreciating the rights of the defendant did some splendid work before the department. The property is a very valuable one, and it is probable that now there will be a big improvement to the springs, among the finest on the coast, and the place be made a resort that will attract many from all parts of the west.
