Keep Federal Fees.

In response to a request from District Attorney L. F. Conn of Lake and Klamath counties, Attorney General Crawford this morning handed down an opinion on the question of fees paid to county clerks.

The question asked was whether the county clerks of Oregon could receive and retain fees collected on making final proof in federal land office matters. The attorney general holds that county clerks, under the laws of this state, cannot retain fees received by virtue of the state laws, but fees received under the federal statutes are the clerks' own, and does not have to be paid into the county treasuries.

Once Track Paid Best.

After paying all bills, the state board of agriculture finds that it has on hand a balance of \$3500 as net proceeds of the recent state fair. The accounts of the several departments have not been made up, but it has been ascertained that the race track was the most profitable feature. The premiums at the races amounted to \$12,000. Of this \$10,000 was donated by the Greater Salem Commercial Club. Entrance fees paid by owners of racehorses amounted to \$7200, and the concessions at the track brought in \$1500. The gate receipts at the fair amounted to \$10,000, and those who saw the crowds in the grand stand say that the races drew at least half the attendance. Upon this basis the race track took in \$14,700 and paid out \$12,000, leaving \$2,700 to its credit.
