The woolen mills at Waterloo, which were destroyed by fire about five years ago, are to be rebuilt in the near future. At least that is the rumor which is being circulated. That there is some foundation for the story is proven by the fact that it came from a prominent citizen of Waterloo, who was in Albany yesterday. A stock company is now being organized, says the rumor, to furnish capital to build the mill. Several wool buyers are interested in the enterprise and it is said that some of the members of the company, which owned the old mills at Waterloo and which yet own the mill site, are also assisting in organizing the stock company.—Albany Herald.
