THE NEW TOMATO TREE.

Singular Specimen That Has Been Propagated from the Vines Bears Fruit.

If one would be considered quite sane one should not discuss the tree tomato even yet. Otherwise one is likely to be reasoned with gently, and informed that tomatoes grow on vines instead of trees, says the Philadelphia Record.

All this to the contrary notwithstanding, there really is a tree tomato. Such a tree is grown by Mrs. Shepherd, at Ventura, Cal. She has grown it several years, and feels that it has a great future as a fruit for shipping. It comes into bearing along during the holidays, when fruits are scarce, and ships long distances perfectly. Some say it is practically hardy in California. This tree, however, grows under glass.

As to the fruit, there seems to be no understanding. Some call this rich, tomato-tinted production fruit; others tomato, which is equivalent to a vegetable. As to flavor, it is said to be a cross between the tomato and the plum, and is equally delicious as a salad or a dessert. Experts think the day is not far off when it will be extensively grown. One good specimen, and about the easiest to get at here in the east, is the one in the Bronx botanical collection in New York. For some time past this tree has hung full of these rosy, plum-shaped fruits, or vegetables, which hang singly or in clusters of two or three or four.

PEACE PORT MONUMENT.

Marks the Spot on Rock Island Where Treaty Was Made with Sac and Fox Indians.

At the lower end of Rock Island, in the Mississippi, was built, in 1815, a fort which was named after Gen. Armstrong, then secretary of war. The encroachments of the Indians, and the need for a rallying place for the white settlers on the banks of the Mississippi, made the fort a necessity. It was built of heavy logs, and was strong enough to resist any attempt of the Indians to capture it. Happily, there never arose an occasion to use the fort for like purposes, and it became but a trading post, says George H. Daniel's Four-Track News.

There was signed here, in 1831, the treaty by which the Sac and Fox Indians agreed to remove to the Iowa side of the river, and leave the village on the banks of Rock river, which they had occupied so long. The fort was 400 feet square, and having access to water, and carrying a large supply of food, was equipped for a long siege.

There now remains nothing of it. Two cannon pointing down the river have been the only things to mark the spot where the Sac and Fox Indians, after years of the daughters of the American Revolution erected a monument there.

WHAT THE POPE SPENDS.

Head of the Catholic Church is a Model Administrator of Large Funds.

As pope, Leo's expenditures are vast—without counting what he spends on Catholic missions, on the inferior clergy, on churches and on education, and upon the support of the 5,000 people who populate the vatican, he maintains within the palace walls, the first factory of mosaics in the world, while for works of art, says an article in Leslie's Monthly, he probably spends more than any other government—and though it is true the vatican receives subscriptions of money from all parts of the world, of which it does not distribute the half, and that its treasures are continually increasing, still it must be remembered that after ten centuries Leo XIII. is the first pope who ascended the throne without temporal power. The budget of the vatican at Christmas is 14,000,000 francs, which are all offerings of the faithful, but it may be imagined that an exceptional administration is needed to obtain this sum yearly, and the pope is a model administrator.

Domestic Wireless Telegraph.

Marconi believes that at some future time—he will not fix a date for it—wireless telegraphy will become available for domestic and office use, thus performing the functions allotted to the telephone. He has already made experiments which convince him that it will be possible, with the aid of small models, or miniatures, of his sending apparatus, as now erected on a gigantic scale at Poldhu and elsewhere, to transmit messages from the interior of rooms which can be received in other rooms in the same city, or in the neighborhood. The walls of the houses will form no obstacle, but one of the chief problems will be that of a proper attuning of the instruments to prevent interference of waves, and to secure privacy for the messages.

To Encourage Tree Planting.

There are many historic trees in the country, and it is believed by the department of agriculture that interest in tree planting can be stimulated by distributing a limited number of these trees under proper direction. The seedlings, when grown, will be sent to schools in various parts of the country, and there will accompany each tree a concise statement setting forth the historic events connected with the tree itself and the growing of the seedling.

Dishonest Farmer Worked Potatoes to Steal.

A farmer residing near Logan Clackamas county, has been discovered in the act of despoiting the commission men in Portland of their profits.

He was seen to take a large stove-pipe about half as wide as the sack, place it therein and fill the inside of the pipe with small and blight-stricken stock. The space between the pipe and the outside of the sack was filled with the choicest potatoes to be found in the farm. The stove-pipe would then be withdrawn and the sack sewed up. The purchaser on opening the sack from any position would only come across the good potatoes, the unit sack being firmly secured in the center.

Several local commission men of Portland have been victimized by this and they sent a man to investigate, the exposure of the trick resulted.

Farm Notes.

Butter that does not taste quite as fresh as it should be greatly improved by putting in a wooden chopping bowl with salt water and thoroughly working over it with a butter worker or even a potato masher. Pour off the salt water and substitute sweet milk, working it into the butter in the same way. Finally wash well with clear, cold water.

All the hogs that are to wintered must be kept in good flesh now and they will go through the winter at half the cost of a thin one.

The Oregon Dairywomen's Association will meet in annual session at Corvallis December 15-16 next. The meeting will be an interesting one and the dairyman are to be the most properly recognized by the citizens of Corvallis.

A Queer Bird.

Ray Miller captured one of the strongest birds ever seen in Oregon near his home at Knox butte, last Saturday. It is thought to be an European coot as it resembles the description of that bird very closely.

Ray was hunting China pheasants at the edge of the butte when the bird flew up. He fired, wounding it and then captured it. The bird is about the size of a female pheasant, is bluish black in color and has three divided webs on each foot. This corresponds exactly with the natural history description of the European coot. These birds are very plentiful in Florida, but as far as known this is the first ever killed in Oregon. Mr. Miller will give the bird Dr. J. L. Hill, who already has a large and valuable collection of natural history specimens.—Herald.
