We cannot conceive of anyone having so little regard for their hard earned dollars as to invest them in a second paper in Scio. The merchants certainly couldn't afford to patronize it for it would necessarily have a very small circulation at the start, and advertising in two papers would double their advertising expenses without materially increasing their benefits. While one paper can make a living here, two papers can not, and must ultimately result in the failure of one of them and the "survival of the fittest," the fittest meaning, in this commercial age, the one that had the money and the nerve to stay up a losing game. We are adding something to the office equipment every week, in the shape of new job type, and other material, and are contemplating purchasing in the near future, a large size job press of the latest pattern and also a gasoline engine, the above improvements being made necessary by the increasing amount of job printing done here by this office. It is also our purpose to keep THE NEWS up with Scio and as the town progresses so shall the paper progress. The business men of the town appreciate the need of a newspaper, and as a rule do well towards its support. When new and permanent advertising demands that the size of the paper be increased, we stand ready to do so.

BANDITS BOMBARD BANK.

Citizens of Newberg Held at Bay.

NEWBERG, Ore., Oct. 19.—Fort two hours this morning, while everything was yet in darkness, this place was practically under control of a gang of bandits, whose object was to blow up the building of the Bank of Newberg and loot the vault of the money on deposit. Though several charges of dynamite were exploded, the steel vault failed to give way and the bandits finally had to give up the attempt and escaped on horseback, going in a northerly direction toward Portland. From all appearances there were three in the party.

The vault contained thousands of dollars, and had the safe-crackers succeeded in blowing it open their booty would have been a rich one. As a result of the attack, the brick building presents a sorry appearance.

At 3 o'clock the citizens of the town were rudely awakened by a series of muffled explosions, the vigorous ringing of the town fire bell and occasional rifle reports. Almost to a man they turned out to see what was the cause of the disturbance, fearing that their homes were in danger from the fire fiend. It was soon learned that the robbers had taken possession of the bank, and the mob turned its attention in that direction. By the time the people reached the scene, however, the bandits had succeeded in getting away.

Persons in the immediate vicinity of the bank had been watching the proceedings since shortly after midnight, but, covered by two men with rifles, they dared not give the alarm. Occupants of the bank building were compelled to remain in their quarters while the walls threatened to go down with every explosion, and they did not dare venture a call for help, as such a move might have meant instant death. Belated residents returning to their homes were warned to remain silent on the penalty of death, and cowed into submission they obeyed the orders of the bandits.

The safe crackers were evidently professionals, and there is no clue to their identity, and no reasonable hope of their capture.

McKinley-Ware Case.

An Oregonian correspondent at Eugene says: "Interest in the case against Miss Mrie Ware and H. G. McKinley is renewing as the time is approaching for their appearance before the Federal grand jury in Portland. Both have a number of friends here who hope to see them escape conviction, but it safe to say they are somewhat uneasy as the time approaches for their trial. The utmost secrecy on the part of the Government is being maintained."
