EDITORIAL.

MAYBE A RAILROAD.

Elsewhere we have made men-
tion of numerous improvements that
will be made in Seio the coming
summer, and there will doubtless be
many more than those already men-
tioned. The chances are that we
will have a railroad which will mean
a great deal more for Seio than any-
thing that has ever been or ever
will be done for the city. The S.
V. Hall Lumber Co. are the prom-
oters of this scheme but as yet they
are undecided as to whether they or
the Southern Pacific will build it.
Negotiations are now and have
been for the past year being con-
ducted with the S. P., but no under-
standing has been arrived at yet, al-
though the S. P. officials informed
Mr. Hall that the Woodburn-Natron
branch would be two miles
closer to them next year, which
would bring it through Seio if that
were done. Mr. Hall informs us
that if they do not come to a favor-
able agreement with the S. P. they
will build their own road from Seio
to their mill, a distance of about six
miles, but in either case, if the S. P.
or themselves build the road, the
people of Seio and vicinity will be
expected to help financially to the
extent of about \$2000. Property
owners can well afford to help this
matter liberally for it will mean a
great increase in property values,
also a large addition to our popu-
lation. The S. V. Hall Lumber Co.
will operate a large mill, and with
their unlimited amount of fine tim-
ber and railroad facilities for placing
the same on the market, Seio will
be the point through which all the
lumber must pass and that will mean
the establishment of several planing
mills here. There are also other
parties interested and I who will com-
bine with Mr. Hall in the building
of the road, and they are the other
large timber holders in that vicinity
who will also put in saw mills. This
railroad question has been agitated
time and time again until the ma-
jority of Seio's citizens have at-
tached given up the idea of a rail-
road to Seio, and we confess such
has been our thoughts until the
coming of their present location of
the Hall Lumber Co. who are com-
pelled to build in order to market
their lumber. They have already
secured the right of way for the
greater part of their road. Develop-
ments are anxiously waited for by
Seio citizens.

Consternation and calamity have
overtaken Zion City, populated with
Dowie's dupes, and "Elijah III" is
struggling in the meshes of bank
ruptcy. He is alleged to be invol-
ent, and Judge Kohlsaat has acted
upon a petition to that effect. The
New York fiasco seems to have been
a suicidal undertaking, and one that
is leading swiftly to the impoverish-
ment and dispersion of the shallow
followers of a false prophet.

Whether "Elijah III" is a colossal
fake or a religious lunatic is a dis-
puted question, but we incline to
the former theory. When Mrs.
Dowie and son left for transatlantic
regions last fall, we suggested that
they presumptively took enough of
the Zion City or its dictator's funds
along with them to make the Dowie
family "solid," and it is now stated
that they took \$6,000,000. It is fair-
ly good prophesying that the bogus
Elijah will leave America for Amer-
ica's good, and try to enjoy the
increment derived from the fanat-
icism of the Zionites. The sufferers
have our sympathy, and it is hoped
the unhappy experience they have
passed through will teach them a
little of what is known as "horse-
sense."

Farm Notes.

Convert all waste lands as fast as
possible into productive fields.

When setting out pear trees select
deep, heavy soil, if you have any
choice, but let it be a well-drained
piece.

When a pig is fed much beyond
eight or nine months, profits are
needlessly thrown away.

With the work teams especially,
besides variety in the grain feed
there should be a variety of rough
feed also.

The point to be secured with all
kinds of stock is to winter as cheap-
ly as possible and at the same time
keep the stock in a good, healthy
condition.

In a majority of cases, in winter
especially, the obstinacy of cream
comes from unsuitable care and im-
perfect temperatures of the cream.

If you do not have enough cows
to make it profitable to own a sepa-
rator, use deep tin pans that can be
immersed in water; deep setting is
the next best method after a cream
separator.

Do not overwork your butter for
that spoils the grain; aim to work it
just enough to get the salt in and
the buttermilk and water out.

Churning cream that is too warm
causes a loss of butter fat and be-
sides injures the quality of butter.
The best temperature lies between
56 and 65 degrees F., according to
the temperature of the room and the
richness of the cream—Pacific
Homestead.

Good seed corn is likely to be val-
uable property next spring.

One advantage with clover is that
it can be grown with a crop of small
grain without any special prepara-
tion of soil for it and at a small cost
for seed.

LUCAVAN NOVELTIES.

Odd Articles from a Little Known
Land Are Now Common in
This Country.

Since the Spanish war, New Yorkers
have shown more interest in the pro-
ducts from the Caribbean. The reason
of this is a commercial matter—no
doubt the West Indians have acquired
an easier method of exchanging pro-
ducts. At any rate, one sees little re-
minders of the lesser known islands
and their inhabitants constantly, says
the New York Post. A few days ago
special prominence was given to im-
portations from the Lucayan islands
by several shops. The Lucayans, popu-
larly called Bahamas, have been heret-
ofore known to Americans as a winter
resort, and outside of the travel-
ing class, few persons have been ben-
efited by their output.

The tongue of the ocean or subma-
rine gulf and lays are the home of the
coral polyp, the progenitor of the is-
lands. The limestone found there-
abouts is easily quarried and made into
quaint souvenirs, the ligum vitae,
pitch, pine and palm match safes; jew-
el trays, and receptacles, are art-
objects of value.

The dumb dog seen in the markets is
said to be a little brother to the me-
coon, and one can purchase with it,
these days, for a Lucayan feast, tam-
arinds, pomegranates, melons, yams,
bananas, and figs.

From the vessels that touch at the
Great Bahamas, Great Abaco, Berry
Island, Cat Island, and Harbor Island,
can be bought humming birds, flaming-
gos, parrots; also, birds of coral, dried
fish, preserved mollusks, turtles, and
other varieties of life from the curious
"garden of the sea."

If the Pope Lives a Year.

It is pointed out that if Leo XIII.

year will be to him one of quite ex-
ceptional interest, a veritable "annus
mirabilis," says the London Tablet.
As everybody knows, it will be his
silver jubilee of papacy (elected pope
February 20, 1878), but more than

as cardinal (proclaimed by Pius IX.
in the consistory of December 19,
1853), and his diamond jubilee of
episcopacy (preconized archbishop of
Damietta by Gregory XVI. on Janu-
ary 27, 1843, and consecrated Feb-
ruary 19), such a triple jubilee, if his
holiness lives to celebrate it, will
probably be unique in history.

Tried to Poison Guards.

Salem Dec. 7.—A story was cir-
culated here today that an attempt
was made recently by prison con-
victs to poison prison guards. In-
quiry at the prison fails to disclose
any material foundation for the
story. The facts as stated by Sa-
perintendent James and by Prison
Physician Shaw, are that the night
of November 29, Night Guard W.
H. Fisher was taken ill after eating
his midnight lunch, and complained
of having a sore mouth. His com-
panion, Taylor Smith, also felt
slightly ill. Neither of them was
sufficiently affected to be incapaci-
tated for duty. Thinking that poison
might have been placed in their food
by the convicts, who prepared it,
they called the other officers and
Fisher was treated by Dr. Shaw,
who prescribed a mouth wash.

Superintendent James, in the
story, stated the facts have been
very much overdrawn. He thinks
there may have been a possibility
that the food was poisoned, but he
does not consider it at all probable
that such a thing was done. In or-
der to take the utmost precautions
he has made an investigation, but
has not discovered anything yet to
lead him to believe that the con-
victs attempted to kill the guards.—
Oregonian.
