Indian war pensions have been received by the following Scio people: J. P. Crabtree, W. R. Maais, John Ray and Mrs. S. E. Miller. They will henceforth receive \$8 per month and will receive back pay from June 27, 1902, to Sept. 4, 1903, which amounts to \$137.10. These pensions are for the 1855-6 Indian war. Pensions pending for Scio people are for Mrs. Nancy Neal and Mrs. Charlotte Thomas, who will no doubt receive their pensions, while if the bill introduced into Congress is passed they will all receive \$12 per month instead of \$8.

They have a number of enterprising miscreants over in Benton county. A new road was laid out in Blodgett valley and a bridge built over a small creek, which for some reason or other was not appreciated. A threshing crew passing that way was warned of danger and told to examine the bridge. Examination showed that some of the timbers was sawed across. About Hop Contracts.

A decision of the supreme court of Oregon handed down recently is to the effect that when a hop grower contracts for the sale of his hops at a certain price per pound and when the crop is ready for delivery the value of the hops is greater than the contract price, the grower is entitled to the advance. If the value of the hops at the time of delivery is less than the contract price, then the dealer is entitled to the depreciation. This being the case, what's the use of a contract anyhow?
