Farm Notes.

Try hard cider—a wine glassful 3 times a day—for ague and rheumatism. Ground and crushed bone is good for fowls young or old. Keep it where the fowls can help themselves it assists digestion, gives strength and furnishes important materials in aiding the growth of fowls.

Do not build the pig pens so near as to deprive the hogs of sunshine and fresh air, yet have them so constructed that they will be warm enough to prevent the pigs from crowding each other in cold weather.

Try taking cod liver oil in tomato catsup if you want to make it palatable. Dry clover, during the winter months has become one of the staple foods for hogs, and those who have tested it say that is more nearly takes the place of green food than any other one thing.

To be the best clover should be second or seed crop, carefully cured in the sun and stored in dry, clean houses. At the LaGrand, Ore., beet sugar factory the capacity is 400 tons of beets daily.

Going Backwards.

The government proposes to return to the old stage system of carrying the mails between Albany and Corvallis as may be seen by an advertisement for bids for carrying mails between the two cities. Bids will be received to be opened Feb. 2 for carrying the mails, to leave Albany at 6:30 a. m. arrive at Corvallis at 8:30 p. m. and arrive at Albany at 8:50 p. m. April 1 to Nov. 30, and half an hour longer for carriage from Nov. 30 to April 1, the contract to begin March 18 and terminate June 30, 1905. Bonds for \$1400 will be required. This will do away with carriage between the two pieces by rail.—Democrat.

MOTOR OF FUTURE.

May Be a Gas Engine of Turbine Description.

Some Learned Opinions on the Subject of Advanced Propulsive Power—The Hope of Engineers. Two of the most revolutionary movements in the science of developing mechanical power that the world has witnessed for several years past are the introduction of the steam turbine and the use of gas exploded in a cylinder behind a piston. A third advance is predicted for the near future, in consequence of combining the two ideas in a gas turbine, states the New York Tribune.

One great advantage of the steam turbine is that it affords rotary motion at the very outset, whereas with the old steam engine it is necessary to employ a crank to convert movement to and fro into rotation. In other respects, too, the mechanism is simpler than the reciprocating engine. It occupies much less space for the same output of power, it is less liable to get out of order, the first cost is lower, and it is beginning to be believed that it is more economical in the use of steam.

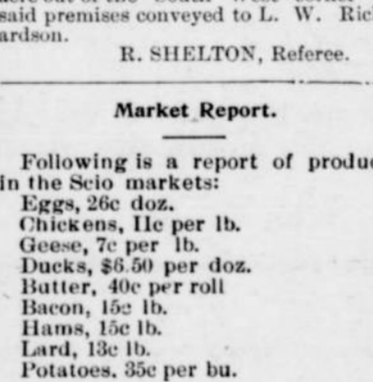
