EDITORIAL.

At every election when there is a dispute between licensing or prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors, votes for license are always urged on the ground that the money received will help pay the public expenditure and thus reduce direct taxation. This argument seems plausible, and heretofore positive proof that it has been lacking. The recent attempt of Governor Bates of Massachusetts to secure one-half of the license fees for the state instead of one quarter, has applied the proof desired by the friends of the prohibition. At the hearing in Boston the mayors of nearly all the license cities in the state were on hand to testify that not one of these cities could possibly get along without all the money they are now receiving from license fees. In nearly every city it was claimed that taxes had raised to the highest limit, and no more money could be expected from that source and if the revenue from liquor license was reduced their city could be replaced. If these testimonies were obtained to bolster up the license systems those who arranged for them were very short-sighted. If cities where license prevail have so much difficulty in getting along even with the revenue it brings, how about the cities which prohibit the sale of liquors, and no license fees? They go along and some of them are quite prosperous. Cities which claimed they would be bankrupted by the loss of license fees are certainly in a worse condition than those which receive none yet pay their debts. On the whole the friends of the license system have supplied the strongest new argument against it which has been brought forward in recent years.

International scope is accorded to the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition to be held at Portland, Oregon, from June 1st, to October 15, 1906, by President Roosevelt's approval of the act of Congress making an appropriation for the Exposition, and his invitation to foreign countries to participate. Portland's Exposition will represent a total outlay of over 16,000,000. Though covering 406 acres of land and natural lake, it will be compact in form, and the average person will be able to see and comprehend it all in a few days at moderate cost. The cream of the foreign and domestic exhibits to be made at St. Louis this year will be transferred to Portland at the close of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition. The United States exhibit will be moved entire to Portland and installed in buildings to be specially erected. This exhibit will be worth \$800,000. In addition Portland will have many features which will not be seen at Ft. Louis, such exhibits as demonstrating the life, customs industries of China, Japan, Hawaii, Siberia, Russia, Alaska, Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines and India.

Probably no man in this section is better known all over the county than G. W. Morrow, democratic nominee for sheriff. He has resided in Seio for the past 36 years and has been successfully engaged in the hotel business for the past 16 years. He was born in Mason county, Washington, coming to Seio in 1867. He was deputy sheriff at Seio for four years, has been a member of our city council for several terms, and has always filled the positions he held with credit to himself and to the satisfaction of all concerned. He has been a life long democrat and until now has never before been the people for favors of any kind. He is a man of integrity and good business principles and when he takes the office of sheriff of Linn county the public may rest assured that the affairs of that office will be managed to the best interest of the tax payers.

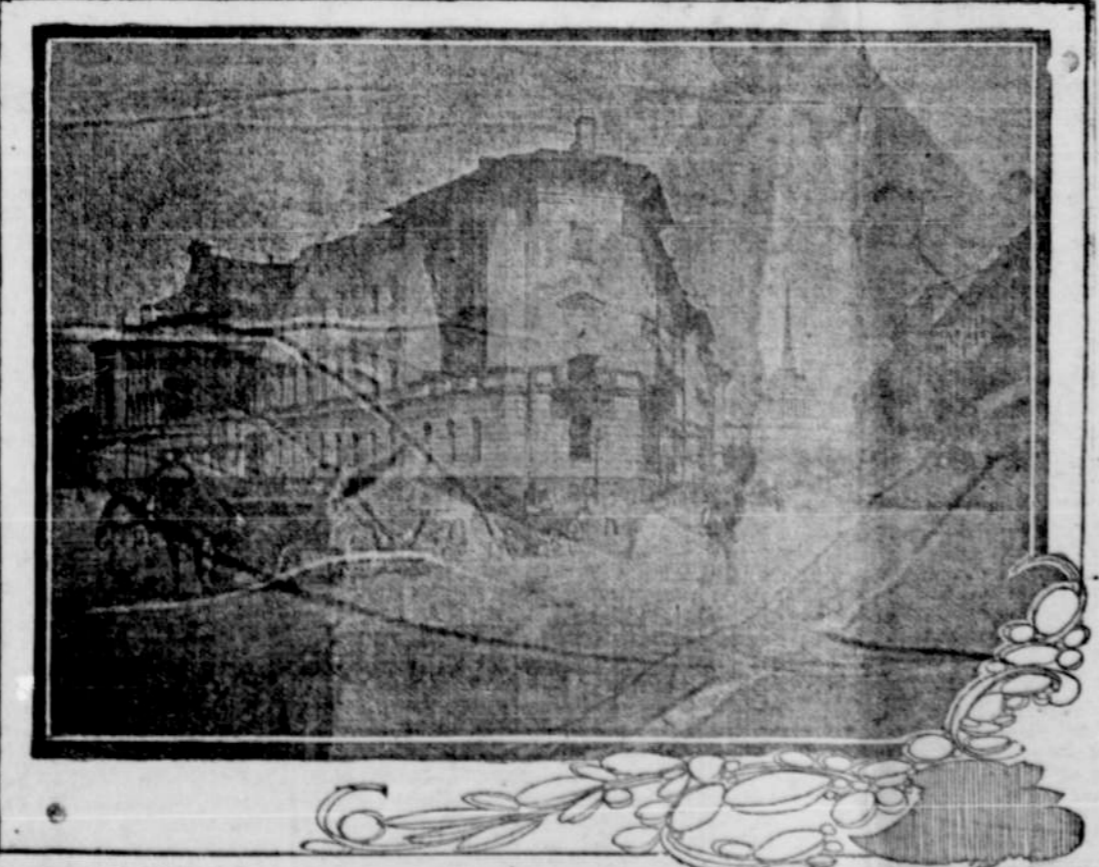
