New Steam Road Roller.

The Linn county court at this term added important machinery to the road building apparatus of the county, when a ten ton Buffalo Pitts steam roller was purchased, costing a little less than \$3,500. Commissioners Russell and Sprenger voted for the purchase of the machine, which was opposed by county judge Palmer, that gentleman holding that the investment was too great, and that the smaller bridges in the county would scarce be able to stand the weight of the machine as it passes over them.

This is a valuable addition to the road building apparatus of the county. In April the court bought two road graders, and another was bought at this term, while a number were secured in former years. A rock crusher was also purchased several years ago, and now another one has been added. This gives Linn county adequate machinery for road building, and the commissioners believed they were justified in adding the road roller, in view of the fact that the condition of the treasury will warrant it, and the proper building of good roads requires it.

WHEN SUICIDE FAILS

Self-Destruction Seldom Attempted a Second Time.

Interesting Observations of a Chicago Policeman Who Has Had Extensive Experience in This Particular Line.

In the opinion of Sergt. Hastings, of the Chicago detective bureau, the will to commit suicide is a good deal like the disposition to commit murder. One man says the Tribune of that city. One man says that he wants to die, may go just to the sticking point, and then back out; another in the same mood may not himself or jump into the water, but, escaping, decide that he has thought of it; or the person of another may once making up his mind to die, make three or four attempts are made necessary.

Sergt. Hastings, who has been registering for the police department the suicides and the attempts at suicide which take place in Chicago, is skeptical of certain attempts at self-destruction.

"One type of person who tries to kill himself," said the sergeant, "has his inspiration in the fact that he is full of drink, has lost his money, perhaps, and is discouraged, and in a fit of pique, such a fellow most frequently jumps up the lake or the river and drowns in it. If he is pulled out and drained, he's most likely to let it go at that. Dying wasn't as easy as he thought and the cold water has sobered him.

"Women frequently may be suspected of making a show of suicide for the effect it may have on a husband who isn't doing just to suit her. By attempting to kill herself she may scare him into behaving himself; or if she has lost hope of that, she knows that she can create sympathy for herself and make it uncomfortable for him.

"Every little while, however, some man or woman commits suicide, and afterward it develops that the person had tried it perhaps three or four times before. In such cases the person is 'in' in general. A person of this kind usually has 'moods,' and when ever one of these moods strikes him his friends and relatives have learned to look out for him.

"There are so many causes for suicide, however, and so many persons of different temperaments attempt it in different ways, and speculation can prove nothing. One can say only that when a person of a certain decision of character goes after his own life he's just as likely to get himself as he would be if he started out to kill somebody else."

"As a general observation it may be said that young men and women at a sentimental age are about as likely to succeed at self-destruction as are persons much older and more worldly wise. Gas has been noted as unusually common in attempts made by elderly men and women, while the young and sentimental seem to prefer the more heroic methods.

"CROWS WEAR FOOL'S CAPS.

How the Farmers of Holland Rid Their Grain Fields of the Mischievous Birds.

The following ingenious method of keeping crows away from the grain field is used by the farmers of Holland:

He makes some small cornucopias of stout paper and smears around the inner side of the mouth of each some birdlime or other adhesive. In these he puts some grains of corn and stands them into his fields by pressing their points into the soft earth.

When the crow finds some of these cornucopias he thinks himself in great luck until he attempts to peck at the tempting grain, when, to his astonishment, he finds the cornucopia attached to his head—a veritable fool's cap—which will not even allow him to see what course to take if he flies up.

However, he succeeds in reaching some coarse grass or bushes, and after much bewildered scrambling and flopping about gets his head out of this undesirable cap and ever afterward avoids the fields where there are more of them.

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.

The municipal expenses of New York are approximately \$100,000,000 a year.

Of 23,000 children placed in families by the children's aid society, only 60 have been arrested and sent to reform schools.

Berlin has its first female barbers—the wife and daughter of a hair-dresser. In Bohemia, Hungary and Scandinavia there are many women barbers.

In the year ending April 1, 1900, Berlin imported from Italy 50 car loads of cherries, 27 of table grapes, 245 of summer fruits, etc. In the following 12 months the business doubled.

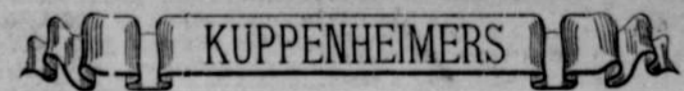
