COW SPORTED FALSE TAIL.

And the Artificial Appendage Was the Cause of a Prolonged Law Suit.

A cow with a false tail figured the other day in a suit for damages before Alderman William A. Means, and because the tail was bogus the suit was withdrawn and the cost were paid by the prosecutor, reports the Pittsburg Chronicle-Telegraph.

Charles Campbell, of Mohler street, entered suit against Henry Muller, of Wheeler street, for damages alleged to have been caused by the ravages in Campbell's garden by a cow, which was said by neighbors to belong to Muller. It was Campbell's own cow, but he did not recognize it without the tail. The case was to have come to a hearing one morning, but at the appointed hour Campbell appeared, withdrew the suit and paid the costs. He then explained the reason to Alderman Means.

Early in the week Campbell bought a cow from John McGuire, who, he said, lives in Frankstown road. He brought the cow home and turned her loose in his garden, but was astonished the other morning to find what appeared to be a strange cow in his patch. The animal had no tail. He was told by some neighbors that the animal belonged to Muller, and the same morning he entered suit before Alderman Means. He also chased the cow out. When he returned to figure up the extent of damage done in his garden he found a cow's tail with bits of rawhide sticking to it. This and other information convinced Campbell that the cow was the one he had bought and which had switched off her tail. For this reason he withdrew the suit.

BIG DAMAGE SUIT FILED.

SCIO MAN SUES THE CITY FOR \$26,447.50.

Frank Vavra of Scio, who has resided in that place for a number of years, yesterday filed a suit against that city for damages aggregating \$26,447.50, alleged to be due on account of injuries sustained in falling off a sidewalk in a dark place, Vavra alleges that on August 15 last, while on his way home from the business part of Scio, he was compelled to cross Thomas creek in that town; that the creek is bridged in the center of the street, and that sidewalks lead up to the creek, and from the sidewalk to the bridge is a narrow board walk; and that the end of the walk extends over the creek and is not protected with guardrails, and in coming along in the dark he walked off the end of the walk and fell into the bed of the creek a distance of eight or nine feet, breaking his leg. As a result of the accident, caused he says, by reason of the city's neglect, he was compelled to go to Portland, where he was placed in St. Vincent's hospital and his leg was amputated. He now asks for \$25,000 damages and \$1,447.50 special damages. The man is penniless and the county is now keeping him and his family, consisting of a wife and four children. He is about 32 years old and a carpenter by trade. The case will come up at the next term of the first department of the circuit court W. L. Holmes and Webster Holmes of Salem and W. R. Bilyeu of this city are attorneys for the plaintiff.—Albany Herald.

RICH IN FOSSILS.

The Bad Lands a Bonanza to the Daring Geological Student.

"The Bad Lands," said Horatio Garrett, one of the most earnest rock collectors of the party from Princeton college that recently visited the Bad Lands of North Dakota and Montana to collect fossils, to a northwest magazine representative, "are a strange combination of desolation, horror and incomprehensible freaks of the primeval world. There are lofty peaks, bare and brown—baked into spires of burning rock by the hot suns of millions of years. The valleys between are white deserts, covered with bitter, dusty and blinding alkali that has made all that country a desert worse than Sahara ever was said to be."

"The rivers run wide or turbid with this alkaline concretion in winter, and are dry and dusty channels in the summer. The peaks, the valleys, and every feature of the whole region, in fact, seems to be thrown down upon the earth in nature's angriest mood—a hideous conglomeration, in which even the geological strata are displaced and entangled. This strange region was once the salt-washed bottom of a sea, and the traces of the receding waves are visible on every hand. The fossils, which were our main pursuit, are mostly aquatic animals. Few birds, and those mostly of the semi-reptilian character, are found among them, while innumerable bones of gigantic saurians dot the shale and sandstone of the valleys. Mixed with them are remains of bear, antelope and buffalo, and relics of an intermediate age, the bones of the mastodons and elephants—not mammoths—and of a three-toed equine, one of the ancestors of the present horse."

"Some of the saurians of the eocene and miocene periods were indescribably hideous. Looking upon the remnants of these monsters and gazing on the awful scenery of the country, a bit of hades upturned to view, one might say—is it any wonder that the Indians shunned the Bad Lands and said they were the haunts of ghosts and the home of evil demons?"

The aggregate tonnage of launches on the Clyde during the month of May constituted a record which has only been twice before exceeded in the whole history of Clyde shipbuilding. Twenty-three steamers were launched, of a total of 54,990 tons; three large sailing ships, totaling 5,676 tons; two steam yachts, of a total of 465 tons, and six sailing yachts of an aggregate of 135 tons. The shipbuilding industry on the Clyde is remarkably prosperous at the present time, and notwithstanding the above abnormal output of new vessels the berths are filled up with fresh orders amounting to about 50,000 tons.

A perpetual cloud of soot, gradually settling down, is known to overhang every large manufacturing city. To determine the amount of this wasteful dirt deposit in Manchester, England, Mr. W. Irwin weighed the solid matter obtained from a sample of snow that had been lying on the ground ten days and has found an equivalent of 167 pounds per acre, or three tons per square mile. As the sample represented the condition over at least 100 square miles, the chimneys of Manchester are convicted of throwing out not less than 700 tons of soot in ten days. Analysis showed 48.9 per cent of carbon, 5.2 of heavy oil and grease, and 23.5 of ash, from which it appears that each day's 20 tons of soot in given adherences by about two tons of matter.
