**DIED OF APOPLEXY.**

A. J. Cary Found Dead Lying Near the Well in His Horse Lot.

About 8 a. m. Monday morning a neighbor having business with John Cary, passed by A. J. Cary's house, who at this time was engaged in pumping water for his stock. Probably an hour later another neighbor observed someone lying at the well and upon investigation it proved to be A. J. Cary, the owner of the place. Help was summoned. Dr. Prill and others sent for. When Dr. Prill arrived he at once pronounced the cause of his death to be apoplexy. Mr. Cary had long been a sufferer from asthma and was in the habit of using liquor to excess. Probably this was the cause of the apoplexy.

Coroner Fortmiller was telephoned for, but after hearing a statement of the case, did not consider it necessary to make an official investigation as there was no indication whatever of foul play.

Mr. Cary, when not under the influence of liquor, was a first-class man, ever ready to do a kind act for friend or neighbor. But when intoxicated was so pugnacious that no one could get along with him peacefully. His dogs were his only companions. When found his clothing was torn and it is evident that his dogs had been trying to strangle him up from where he had fallen.

Abner J. Cary was born in Missouri, was 70 years, 6 months and 13 days. He came to Oregon in the early days and was one of the country builders. He was the owner of a good farm to which they had one heir, John Cary.

**OREGON DEVELOPMENT LEAGUE.**

The Oregon Development League, which counts as members thirty-three active commercial bodies, has already become the most thoroughly representative state organization of its character in the United States. The next session of the Oregon Development League will be held at Grants Pass, Friday, September 23, and a large number of delegates from other cities and towns will be present. Among the speakers will be Hon. F. L. Smith, of Hood River, president of the organization, and vice president, F. J. Blakeley, of Roseburg. Others who will go from Portland, are Mr. B. B. Beckman, H. M. Calk, president of the Portland Commercial Club, W. E. Conan, general passenger and ticket agent of the Southern Pacific and, Tom Richardson, secretary of the League.

Articles written for competition and appearing in papers printed outside of Oregon as a result of the prizes offered by the Portland Commercial Club, are acceptable in all papers published by October 1. No action will be taken by the judges until October the fifteenth. In the language of the street "There is a chance to pick up some easy money," in these contests, as the competition is not anything like as great as people had expected, and there is ample time if you write at once.

No exhibit at the state fair was more timely than that connected with the roads demonstration. Roadmaking has become more of a science than ever, and modern methods are about right. It is evident that in any country like this, with heavy winter rains, a suitable foundation must be the first essential of any road that is to last and be satisfactory. The grading is done at the fair, coarse rock is laid down, rolled, and finer rock follows, the rolling process being continued until a smooth and finished surface results, capable of defying winter and summer wear, and making travel a pleasure rather than a burden. Modern vehicles are nearly perfect. The progress and prosperity of rural districts are ordinarily now closely related to the state of the roads. This state spends enough in wagon and buggy repairing and replacing every year to make a decent road system through the state, the present highways being most wonderfully trying to horses and vehicles. Interest on the subject is growing. Before the election all candidates professed to see the importance of the matter. This is just a reminder, lest someone forget. The year has not been as propitious as it might have been for some branches of the great agricultural industries, but let what money that is available for roads be spent to the best advantage.—Salem Journal.
