A Stabbing Affray.

At a social dance at Clark's mill beyond Waterloo Friday night Wm. Fitzwater and Jessie McKinney had a quarrel, resulting in Fitzwater drawing a knife and slashing McKinney with it, cutting a hole in his left side in the ribs. McKinney fled from the room followed by Fitzwater. Dennis Taylor standing by the door grabbed Fitzwater, when the latter stabbed him in the wrist of the left hand, striking the back and making a bad wound. Then Fitzwater fled for the woods. A warrant was issued at Lebanon for his arrest.

Fitzwater was arrested Sunday by a posse of men after him, and was taken to Lebanon to await examination. Deputy District Attorney Gail Hill, went out Monday morning to conduct the prosecution, but the case was continued on account of the condition of the prosecuting witness, unable to testify now—Democrat.

Fitzwater's Version.

William Fitzwater waived examination at Lebanon on the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, upon Jesse McKinney and Dennis Taylor, and upon failure to secure \$1000 bonds required by Justice Loveloe is now a boarder in the county jail.

Will Fitzwater, in jail charged with assault with a dangerous weapon upon Jesse McKinney and Dennis Taylor at a dance at Clark's mill, tells an entirely different version from that heretofore given. He says that in the quarrel McKinney knocked him down and jumped on him, when he succeeded in getting his knife out of his pocket and hitting McKinney, whose own weight added much to the depth of the cut. Fitzwater wore a borrowed coat, too large, and this partially made him stumble when he attempted to rise. McKinney jumped up and started for the door, then Fitzwater thoroughly angry, started after him. Taylor slammed the door to, and Fitzwater unintentionally hit his wrist with the knife.

Fitzwater has retained Weatherford & Wyatt and will fight the case. Bonds will probably be secured.

Committed Suicide.

Calvin A. Powell committed suicide at his home in Waterloo precinct, ten miles beyond Lebanon, during Sunday night shooting himself in the mouth, and his body was found Monday morning with the revolver beside it. Trouble is supposed to have been the cause. His wife is reported to have left him. A few months ago Delbert Devine was arrested for rape upon his daughter Ivy, under 15, settled by marriage at Walla Walla. Upon instructions from Governor Fortmiller, Justice Loveloe of Lebanon, went out Monday afternoon and held an inquest.

He was 38 years of age, a son of Peter Powell.
