In Oregon agt. Ira Connitt District Attorney McNary reported an important witness for the state absent and if not found stated that a continuance would be asked for.

Katie Kump agt. C. L. Williams on several accounts, will be tried before the court with a dummy jury.

J. W. Bledsoe agt. the Calapoola Lumber Co. was ordered continued after warm argument.

The case of the state of Oregon agt. Geo. Hughes, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, was on trial.

The case is being tried before the following jury: Wm. Brenner, A. Parlow, John Young, John Miller, J. H. Scott, L. Workinger, John Wolfe, Thos. Barnes, H. C. Bishop, J. D. Smith, H. C. Jackson, L. R. Chambliss.

District Attorney McNary and Deputy Hill appear for the state and Weatherford & Wyatt for the defendant.

The next trial will be that of Sarah Cleland agt. C. & E. For damages on account of an accident last year.

All the jurymen were present but Jas. Koster, B. F. Titus and O. D. Overton, reported out of the county. T. J. Butler was excused on account of being a county commissioner and L. C. Trask a postmaster.

The first grand jury for several years was drawn, and consisted of Henry Blakey, foreman, Geo. E. Haven, G. R. Whitlow, W. F. Pfeiffer, G. B. Huber, Henry Struckmeyer and N. R. Lee. Bailiff of grand jury W. H. Warner. General bailiff W. C. Tweedie.

The case of Oregon agt. George Hughes, tried on the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon upon Louis Maynard, was given to the jury, which after being out until 9:30 brought in a verdict of assault and battery, and Thursday morning at 9 o'clock was set for pronouncing sentence.

A true bill was brought in by the grand jury against John Scott of Brownsville, on the charge of assault with intent to commit rape upon Florence McElroy, a girl under sixteen years of age, on July 25 of this year. The defendant this morning pled not guilty, and his attorney, Messrs. Barney Martin and N. H. Neapart applied for a continuance of the case. A demurrer to the indictment, on the grounds that it contained two causes of action was denied.

A motion for the continuance of the case made by the defendant was overruled, and it was ordered tried at this term, probably next on the docket.

Commercial Cream Co. agt. S. V. Hall continued, there being no appearance.

Coolidge & McLaine agt. Paul Linbeck for recovery of money was denied.

Saran Cleland agt. the Corvallis & Eastern Railway Company was passed on trial, R. R. Gilmer, of Portland, and W. R. Bilyeu, of Albany appearing for the plaintiff and Weatherford & Wyatt and W. S. McFadden for the defendant. The suit is for damages by an accident happening July 3, 1903.
