Death of the Aged.

It is very seldom indeed that a newspaper is called upon to chronicle the death of two exceedingly old men in one and the same issue. Both of the subjects of this local had lived a quarter of a century longer than most old men live. They were both pioneers and respected citizens.

GRANDPA CLARK.

Cardwell Clark died at his home near Lacombe last Sunday at nine o'clock p. m. He had not been sick any great length of time, nor did he suffer greatly. The vital machinery that had supported his body for 94 years, was simply worn completely out and refused to further perform its functions. He was Linn county's oldest citizen. He crossed the plains from Missouri to California in 1852 and came to Oregon in 1871. He purchased the Elkins donation land claim near Lacombe and moved thereon in 1872, where he has ever since resided. Sixty-four years ago he was united to his wife, who will shortly follow him to the spirit world. To them were born thirteen children, of whom only five are now living. George, Marsh and Charles, of Lacombe, Mrs. Mary Pendum, of Pendleton, and Mrs. Emma Downing, of Scio.

All of the children, we believe, were at his bedside when he passed away.

On the farm purchased in 1872 was a sawmill which has been known for many years as "Clark's Mill." This mill has been owned and operated by himself or some member of the family up to the present time.

In religion Grandpa Clark had been a consistent member of the Baptist church for many years. He was an especially religious man, of whom no man, woman or child ever spoke an ill word.

In politics Mr. Clark was a staunch Republican. He never failed to cast his vote for the presidential candidate of that party, except upon two occasions; the first being when he was crossing the plains and could not vote or lack of opportunity, and the other was at the late election, when he was too ill to go to the polls. Indeed, he was a voter before the Republican party was born, and voted for the last nominee of the Whig party.

Seldom do men live to his great age. His correct and temperate habits, together with an even temper, no doubt enabled him to add many years to a useful and well-spent life. Such men, though in the lowly walks of life, furnish examples of right living, of sterling integrity that makes the world better for the example they furnish.

The burial occurred at Providence cemetery on Tuesday at 11 o'clock a. m. and was largely attended.

WILLIAM MILLER.

William Miller died at his home in Salem last Saturday evening, aged 89 years and eight months. Mr. Miller was born in Scotland, where he grew to manhood and married his first wife. They immigrated to the United States about 60 years ago and came to Oregon in 1846 and settled in Yamhill county some ten miles below Salem on his donation land claim.

He has been married three times, his third wife and a daughter by his first wife, Mrs. Kellogg, of Polk county, now mourn his demise. He had a great number of nephews and nieces, Mr. R. B. Miller, of this city being one of the former.

Mr. Miller was an exemplary citizen and brought with him from Scotland characteristic habits of thrift, industry and integrity, that made him, though but an ordinary citizen, one of value to the state. We need many such men of rugged sterling integrity. When such men pass away they are sorely missed by the community in which they lived.
