One of Our Earliest Pioneers.

Last week as we went to press we
heard of the death of Abram Hack-
leman, one of Albany's earliest pio-
neers. The following sketch of his
life is given by the Albany Demo-
crat:

Mr. Abram Hackleman died at
his home in this city on property
owned by him for 57 years, during
Wednesday night of pneumonia, at
the age of 75 years.

He was born in Indiana, moved
from there with his parents to Iowa
when a boy, and came to Oregon in
1847. His father came here in 1849
and took up the original donation
land claim of the city of Albany,
now covered by the four additions
of the city east of Montgomery
street and had Hiram N. Smead
hold another, that part was of
Montgomery street, until his sons
should arrive. The next year he
went back after his family, was
taken ill and died. Then Abram
arrived and settled on his father's
claim, but was obliged to relinquish
the other side, which in 1848 was
to eight of Mr. Smead by Walter
and Thomas Muntz for \$400, they
having arrived from Albany, N. Y.

From that time Mr. Hackleman
made Albany his home, doing much
for the progress of the city, taking a
leading part in the affairs of the
valley. He also became interested
in valuable property in Crook county
building up a large stock business
there.

He took an active part in the pro-
motion of many of Albany's leading
institutions. He was once a city
councilman, in 1872 and in politics
was a democrat.

He was married twice; first to
Eleanor B. Davis, who died several
years ago, and afterward to his
present wife, who survives him,
with three sons, Mr. T. P. Hackle-
man, the well known lawyer, Mr.
D. D. Hackleman and Mr. Frank
Hackleman, all of this city, and one
daughter, Mrs. Pauline Price, wife
of W. K. Price, of Toke. One daugh-
ter, Josephine, is dead.

He assisted in organizing the
first county fair, of which he was
president for several terms. He
was one of the originators of the
movement which secured the loca-
tion of the Willamette Valley and
Cascade Wagon Road, an enterprise
of great importance to Linn county.
He was a member of the Christian
church.

The funeral service was held at
the Christian church Friday after-
noon at two o'clock.

The Trappist Colony.

A special dispatch from Albany in
Sunday's Oregonian says of the
Trappist Fathers who purchased
land in Bilyeu Den, near Jordan
some weeks ago, and of whom the
NEWS made note at the time:

A colony of Trappist Fathers has
been founded in Jordan Valley, in
the northern part of Linn County.
Having been forced to leave their
homes in France because of relig-
ious persecution, a number of these
Trappist Fathers have come to the
United States, and six of them lo-
cated in Jordan Valley about three
months ago, with the ultimate ob-
ject in view of founding a Trappist
colony there. They recently pur-
chased considerable land, and are
preparing to make extensive im-
provements, in anticipation of the
arrival of more than 50 of the same
order from France next Spring.

The Trappists are planning to
erect a monastery, to be known as
the Monastery of Our Lady of Jor-
dan. They will also build churches
and schools, increasing the number
as the size and importance of the
colony demand. They expect to
construct and operate mills and fac-
tories, and various manufacturing
establishments, beside engaging in
farming and stock raising. In short,
they will endeavor to establish and
maintain an ideal Trappist colony,
the Trappists being a working order.

The colony will cover a great
many acres, and the manufacturing
institutions will be an important ad-
dition to the industries of Linn
county. Jordan Valley is practi-
cally undeveloped in comparison
with most of the county, and the
Trappists have splendid opportuni-
ties and great natural advantages
to develop important industries in
their colony. The construction of
some of the buildings of the colony
will commence immediately.

Articles of incorporation for the
colony were filed with the County
Clerk of Linn County yesterday, the
institution being incorporated under
the name of the Monastery of Our
Lady of Jordan. The incorporators
were Revs. Fathers Henry Pelletan,
George Callard and Chas. Crespeau,
the capital stock being \$7000.

The Trappists are a well-known
Roman Catholic order, founded in
the 12th century by St. Bernard.
They are now being expelled from
France because of a difference in re-
ligious opinion, and those who have
located in the Jordan colony are
from the Abbey of Fontgombault, in
the Province of Berni. The Trap-
pists have been farmers and second-
ary manufacturers for centuries,
and live entirely by the fruits of
their labor.
