Albany held a city election on
Monday, for the purpose of electing
three councilmen. The result showed
the election of J. L. Tomlinson, S.
A. Dawson and E. R. Huston.

Scio last Saturday. He purposes
staying the winter in our town.

Mrs. Blake, of Bushon, Kansas,
was the only person who answered
Weesly Bros. late puzzle ad in full.
A number of others solved the riddle
in part, but no one answered in full
but the Kansas lady.

Three deaths inside of 24 hours, in a
single country community, is an un-
usual occurrence. Such however was
true of the vicinity of Scio, during the
period of from 1 a. m. Tuesday morning
to 4 o'clock in the afternoon of the same
day.

Last Thursday, the Peterson &
Dunbar, unique theatrical troupe
came to town and exhibited to full
houses during the remainder of the
week. They have a small but ex-
cellent brass band that discoursed
some fine street music.

H. Bryans, the well known Albany
financier, was in our city last Friday
on business. He has just returned

and is fully convinced that we live
in a great big country whose re-
sources are practically unlimited.

culations are sold for \$1.50 per year.

country paper.

Some dastardly mind attempted
to set fire to the Central school build-
ing in Albany, Monday night. The
fire was set near the furnace. Luck-
ily some passers by discovered the
incipient blaze before it had made
any headway. A few buckets of
water was sufficient to put out the
blaze.

The sale of the Scio Roller Mills
to E. W. Langdon, was this week
confirmed by the county court. It
is understood that Mr. Langdon
bought the mill property for a com-
pany composed in part of Scio citi-
zens, which will at once be incor-
porated and the mill be placed upon
a permanent basis of operation.

A daughter of Madison Calavan of
near Jordan, one day last
week jumped from a rail fence. In
doing so she injured her left leg.
The family supposed the injury to
be a sprain and applied home reme-
dies for a week before Dr. Prill was
called. Upon examination he found
one of the bones of the left limb
broken near the ankle.

Assessor McKnight has completed
the assessment roll and is now ready
for copying. The aggregate value
of property carried on the rolls is
\$5,521,000. This is an increase over
the amount of last year's roll of
\$4,075,688. Timber lands of the N. P.
R. are assessed at \$6 per acre. Let
us hope the collection of taxes on the
same will be enforced.

Dr. B. W. Schaffner, who looked
after Dr. Prill's practice during his
