Death of Manager Stone.

Copey's Clothing Factory.

The Telegram last Friday evening gave an extended account of the proposed clothing factory of the Bannockburn Manufacturing Co. in Portland, in a central location, to be started soon. The capital stock is to be \$200,000. The building is to be 50x200 feet, two or three stories in height, and will manufacture clothing on a large scale. The fabrics will be manufactured in Albany, and the capacity of the mill will be increased 50 per cent. Albany is a desirable location for the mill, being the center of the best wool producing section of the United States, each Mr. Copey. The water power here is a fine one and plenty of soft water for the wool, essential in the manufacture of good cloths.
