The manufacture of gold pens will form one of the many interesting work displays at the Lewis and Clark Exposition. The Lewis and Clark Exposition will be open to the public as large as the pavilion the state erected at St. Louis.

Fraternities of the United States have organized for the purpose of erecting a Temple of Fraternity at the Lewis and Clark Exposition. Over \$20,000 has been pledged toward the project, and the erection of a beautiful and appropriate structure is assured.

Independent Telephone.

The independent telephone meeting assembled on Tuesday as per adjournment of two weeks ago with F. J. DeWitt as chairman and Geo. DeVarnay, secretary.

After reports from the committee sent to Brownsville, was heard, various remarks were made in regard to the pending propositions of the independent telephone company. All appeared to be at least in the matter and sort of free-for-all talk prevailed for a while.

After much discussion, pro and con, Mr. DeVarnay proposed that each of the lines connected with the Scio exchange should visit Corvallis and examine the plant in that city and see for themselves whether he was misrepresenting matters. As an evidence of his sincerity he deposited \$40 with the chairman as an earnest of his proposition. After which the meeting adjourned to meet Feb. 25.

As far as we could see no progress was made toward organizing independent lines. Exact figures were not at hand as to the cost and nothing definite was accomplished.

Dynamite explosion.

Dr. Prill was called Monday night to visit the family of Mr. Ed Smith of Mt. Rainier. Dr. Prill relates, as the cause of the call, the following:

Mr. Smith desiring to replenish the fire went to the wood shed and gathered up a bucket of chips, pouring the chips upon the fire in the open fire place. In front of the fire sat Mrs. Smith and the two children. Soon a terrific explosion occurred. The conclusion was that Mr. Smith had gathered up a dynamite cart edge in the bucket of chips. He had no knowledge how it could have been placed there. In the cartridge was the brass cap, which was burst into thin shreds of course, flew in every direction. Mrs. Smith and the children being struck in numerous places; none, however of serious importance, except one place that entered the corner of Mrs. Smith's eye. Dr. Prill stated the particles were about the size of a grain of powder. The explosive force was sufficient to drive these particles through three or four thicknesses of cloth and penetrate the flesh. Mr. Smith will probably examine his chips closely in the future.

An Accomplished Woman

Under the Head of Women's Work, the Sunday Journal gives the following: For over nine years Miss Crawford has held the position of teacher of education and physical culture at Corvallis, and, aside from her proficiency as a teacher, which is confirmed by her long term of service, she is one of the most popular educators at the college. An exception, speaking of her, lately said: "She was just one of us girls; we all liked her, and didn't mind a bit to have her for a chaperon."

A native of Lion county, whose parents crossed the plains in the early days, Miss Crawford is truly a daughter of the state. After graduating from the Albany college she took a two years' course in the college, University at Willamette University, graduating in June, 1886, and a month later was invited to take the position of professor of education at the Oregon Agricultural college, where she has been ever since.

At the present time Professor Crawford has 100 young women under her care in the physical culture class, and 200 pupils in education.

Miss Crawford's parents were firm believers in the advancement of women, and from earliest days advocated equal privileges for all the citizens of the state, and following in their footsteps, is an ardent suffragist, and justly accepted the vice-presidency for Benton county of the State Equal Suffrage society, and looking forward with much pleasure to being at the national convention in Portland next June.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Jones now live at home, thank you. It is not stated whether Father Luckenbach moved to get clear of Fred, or whether Fred just wanted to try the experiment of keeping himself, at all events, it all events, the two families moved to separate directions, the first of the week. Lebanon Bank Robbers Captured

The report that the Lebanon bank robbers had been captured proved true. Four men were secured Saturday night, but as there were two others in the gang who had fled it was kept secret, and not even the Oregonian got onto it.

The Telegram secured the facts. W. H. Millhollen acting as deputy sheriff went to Portland. Some men who had been seen in Albany were suspected. Sheriff Word with four deputies went to the place of the gang supposed to have come to, captured four men, Dunn, Culver, Smith and Darling, and with them money and things which will positively identify them as the Lebanon robbers. J. F. Kingsley, leader of the gang, with his wife had gone to Seattle, and another member of the crew was away.

The men have power of the night-hood, where they had their headquarters in different capacities. Darling was a religious man, Kingsley was an Englishman of some blood, and moved in good society. Dunn had been a house-mover, Smith had been in a store robbery, escapee and the other men are said to be survivors.

There is little doubt but what the right men have been secured, and that there will be evidence to convict the entire gang whether all were actually in the robbery or not.

Here is the way the discovery was made. Mr. Millhollen who now resides in South Portland, was in Albany the day before the robbery. While here he saw two men, of suspicious character residing very well in Portland, whom he knew very him. After the robbery he reported the fact to Sheriff Word, resulting in the arrest of the entire gang, two of them being the men seen.

Besides the six men in the robbery there were undoubtedly two Lebanon men. The robbers had headquarters near the Lamberson warehouse, and yesterday three bottles of whiskey and cigars left by them were found there. Upon escaping the men probably went into Portland by two, a couple getting on the train in Benton county, going down the west side, and the others some other way. John Sullivan's bicycle has been missing since then, and perhaps was used on the C. & E.
