Just On Account Of A Cayuse.

Last summer when Harry Beard was over in the Princeton country, he desired and obtained a saddle horse from Mr. Kinsey, to use for the horse's keep, it being understood that the horse was only to be used in that locality. In the fall when Harry desired to return to the valley, he made the mistake of riding the same he borrowed horse and, to complicate matters, when he reached Lebanon, sold the horse to Lee Gussard. In due time Mr. Kinsey began to be somewhat anxious as to what had become of his horse. He soon learned what had become of the horse, and that Harry after stopping a short time in Scio, had gone to Portland, where he had secured work. Kinsey went to Portland last week, and began to investigate matters. In three or four days he located Harry and in order to adjust matters he required Harry to come with him to this city. Gussard had disposed of the horse to C. E. Scott, of Lebanon, who in turn traded the horse to Wm. Brenner of this city, who retained possession of the animal up to Tuesday. Mr. Kinsey did not desire to commence a criminal prosecution, but wanted his horse restored to him. It was finally agreed that if Beard would raise the value of the horse to reimburse the party to whom he had sold the animal, and Mr. Kinsey's property be restored to him, the matter would be dropped. This is the status of the case at the present time, and there will probably be nothing further done.

A \$2,000 Gold Brick.

It was learned from Salem last evening that William Vance of this city, was the victim of the gold brick deal in which \$2,000 was sunk by him in a supposed Arizona mine. The deal was completed in that city where Mr. Vance paid out \$2,000 as a part payment for a \$75,000 mine, doing so against the protests of his daughter Miss Lora, who telegraphed a Salem attorney on Friday to stop the deal if possible, but Mr. Vance went into the deal anyway. The men were slick fellows and are now well out of the country, with a small fortune, accumulated through many years, in their pockets.

The affair was worked in the usual way, with a mixed mass of brass and ore from the supposed mine in evidence, etc.

The principal manipulator of the robbery was one William Dunn. He came to Albany on Tuesday, Feb. 14, and registered at the Revere House, taking his first meal in the evening, and leaving after breakfast the next morning, probably on the Alx. by road for Salem. He registered as W. Dunn, with " " under Chicago following the name above.

The man on this trip probably only surveyed the field. He returned again on Thursday, when he called upon Mr. Vance and made arrangements for the sale of an interest in the mines in Arizona, but the amount of money that was to be paid was not settled upon. Dunn and Mr. Vance went to Salem on the noon train Thursday, when the mass of ore which the fellow had as a sample of the mines, was assayed, by the fact: assayed, who was his confederate, and it showed up a marvelous wealth. The deal was completed and Mr. Vance paid Dunn about \$2,000 at Ladd & Bush's bank, and not \$10,000 as reported, and the fellow of course at once decamped.

Mr. Vance returned to Albany Friday noon, and was informed by close friends that he had probably been bilked. Saturday noon a note was received from Dunn telling him of the fact, and the news prostrated him, for previously he had insisted that it was all right. He and his daughter Miss Lora went to Portland, where they are stopping at the home of W. E. Poncelet. Mr. Vance, though taking the affair to heart, is not in a dangerous condition as reported, the doctor is informed by his brother-in-law.

The case is in the hands of detectives, and it is said there are clues, but it is doubtful if the men are ever captured.—Wednesday's Democrat.
