TIME TO MOVE.

If The People Desire To Avail Themselves Of The Provisions Of The Referendum. No Time Should Be Lost.

We have been solicited to take the initiative as a citizen in taking the steps necessary, by which the provisions of the Referendum may be invoked as to the big appropriations bill passed by the recent legislature. To that end we suggest that a public meeting of the citizens of the forks of the Santiam be held at the city hall, in the city of Scio, on Saturday March 11, 1905, at 1 P. M.

We will endeavor to have some good speakers present, who will be able to discuss the matter in an intelligent manner, and advise as to the correct mode of procedure. It is desired that at least representatives from all parts of the forks shall be present.

The Big Woodman Rally.

The big W. O. W. rally at Albany was pulled off as per schedule. Trains from the early morning to late in the afternoon, brought Woodmen from every point. In the big parade, seven bands participated. At night some 600 candidates mounted the several gaudy prepared for the occasion. Initiatory ceremonies were conducted at several different halls. The train work of the various lodges is said to have been very fine.

The blowout will be long remembered by the members as a Red Letter. Such rallies cannot help but increase interest in the order.

Alert Officers.

The prompt action of Health Officer Prill and Marshal Blyen in promptly quarantining families, who have been so unfortunate as to contract contagious diseases, is very commendable and should meet with hearty approbation from all our citizens. In the case of the family of the late G. C. Johnston, their action was justified by all, but in the cases of the families of H. Phillips and C. D. Compton, we are told that the officers are censured somewhat as being needlessly strict. In Mr. Phillips' family, a light case of Scarlet fever was developed. The disease can be transmitted so readily from a patient with a slight attack, as from one who may be stricken, fatally. The Comptons have well developed cases of the measles and of course should be excluded from others. In both instances the action of the officers are eminently proper. Too much care cannot be exercised in the prevention of the spread of contagious diseases. Officers ought to be commended even if they err on the side of carefulness, as they would be condemned if careless.

Independent Telephone Will Win.

Indications now point towards the winning out of the effort to establish an Independent Telephone System in the forks of the Santiam. The meeting of last Saturday was liberally attended. The committee which had been selected at a previous meeting, to visit Corvallis and inspect the DeVarey system in operation at that place, rendered a most flattering report. After the report was read, Chairman Denny called for signatures for the organization of the new company. Some 30 or 40 were obtained, which in addition to the 30 obtained at a previous meeting was considered quite sufficient for a starter. After some discussion and explanation, several persons, who had previously been opposed to the independent movement, were won over. It is now thought that a large majority of the patrons of the 17 lines in Scio and vicinity will favor the new company. A committee consisting of T. M. Holt, Frank Gaines, Albert Randall, John Calavan, Geo. Harris, Joe Simanek, Geo. L. Sutherland and A. P. Hibone, was appointed to prepare a code of by-laws for the regulation of the company, and Saturday March 4, 1905, named as the day for the next meeting, at which time it is expected that permanent organization will be effected, officers elected, by-laws adopted, etc.

Whether the new venture will be cheaper than the old, remains to be demonstrated. If Mr. DeVarey installs satisfactory service as Corvallis now has, the people will be satisfied. We hope the venture will prove satisfactory and cheaper in the end, than what the P. S. company supplies.

As will be noticed on our local page, we have issued a call for a public meeting of taxpayers, in this city, for the 11th inst. We do not wish to be regarded as being overcautious, but this duty devolves upon some one. As a taxpayer in common with others, we desire sincerely to set down on the system of graft that has grown up in our state under the worthy name of "Education," and as the power rests within the hands of the people to do so, and that it is necessary for some one to start the ball rolling, we offer no further excuses for taking the initiative.

A case that aroused the sympathy of some of our citizens, occurred last week. Two boys, approaching manhood, got into difficulty, were arrested and fined by the recorder. One of the boys was able to pay his fine and did so; the other did not have the necessary cash and was incarcerated in the city jail. The conditions of the case were of such a nature that they appealed to the sympathies of some of our citizens, and the necessary amount of cash, with which to pay the fine was raised by subscription. It is also stated that the last mentioned of the boys, was the least blameworthy of the difficulty.

Mrs. Stanford Is Dead In Honolulu.

HONOLULU, H. I., March 1.—Mrs. Jane Lathrop Stanford, widow of United States Senator Stanford, of California, died at the Moana hotel here at 11:40 last night, probably as the result of poisoning. When taken ill at 11 o'clock she exclaimed: "This is a horrible death to die."

Before retiring last night, Mrs. Stanford took a dose of bicarbonate of soda, purchased in San Francisco. It is reported that this soda contained strychnine, but the report cannot be verified. Dr. F. H. Humphreys, her physician has made an examination of the contents. The bottle had not been touched since Mrs. Stanford left San Francisco, and he refused to disclose the result.

At 11 o'clock, A. Heunische, of San Francisco, a guest at the Moana, who occupied an adjoining room, heard Mrs. Stanford groaning, and running to the room, found her lying on the floor. She had evidently tried to summon help. When her death took place less than three-quarters of an hour later, Miss Berner, her secretary, and Miss May Wilson, her maid, were present. Both are prostrate.

Mrs. Stanford came to Honolulu from San Francisco on the Korea February 21. She admitted to Mrs. Henry Hill-ton of San Francisco, who is now in Honolulu, that she had attempted to poison her in San Francisco, and that she had sailed on the Korea for this reason. Mrs. Highton says Mrs. Stanford told her enough poison had been used in the attempt to kill 20 people.

Mrs. Stanford retired short y after 10 o'clock last night. She had attended a picnic during the afternoon, and took no dinner.

The remains were taken to an undertaking establishment, where they are awaiting an autopsy.

The investigations of the police have failed so far to find any evidence of poisoning, but the authorities decline to express any opinion pending the result of the autopsy and the analysis of the bottle of bicarbonate of soda. A box of capsules was also found in the room, and these are being analyzed.

Miss Berner has been Mrs. Stanford's secretary for 20 years. Former Judge W. L. Stanley represents the Stanford estate here.—Thursday's Herald.
