Mohair Pool Being Formed.

Last year the mohair growers formed a pool and were able to market their product at the highest market price. At that time about 400 fleeces were pooled. This year it is thought from 1200 to 1500 fleeces will be put in the combine. The price being offered here now is 28 to 29 cents per pound. A pool that was formed over at Jefferson was sold for 31 1/2 cents. Our growers expect to get about that figure for the pool now forming.

Minerals And Stones Wanted.

The Linn County Lewis and Clark Exhibit Committee, in charge of the work of collecting and preparing the county exhibit for the great Exposition, desires to make a most complete exhibit of the minerals, building stones, etc., native to the county. That this end may be attained, the undersigned, chairman of the committee on Mines and Metallurgy, asks that every citizen lend his assistance in getting the exhibit for this department. Any one knowing of the existence of any mineral, stone, etc., as enumerated below, will confer a favor on the committee by notifying the chairman at once where same may be obtained, or, if possible, by delivering same to him or to County Judge Stewart at Albany.

Ornamental and building stones, such as marble, granite, slate and all other building stones, rough hewn, sawed or polished; rocks which produce lime or cement; gneisses, whetstones, conglomerates, fire-clays and sands, moulding sands, flint, felspar, brick, terracotta, glass, etc.; mica, asbestos, gypsum, graphite, and other non-metallic minerals; gems and precious stones, natural salts, mineral waters of all kinds, sulphur and pyrite, natural mineral paints, asphalt and asphaltic rocks, mineral oil and wax, mineral fuels, and luminants, such as peat, bituminous coal, lignite, anthracite, coal dust and compressed coal, petroleum, gold, silver, lead, copper, iron, and other mineral bearing rocks of every kind and product.

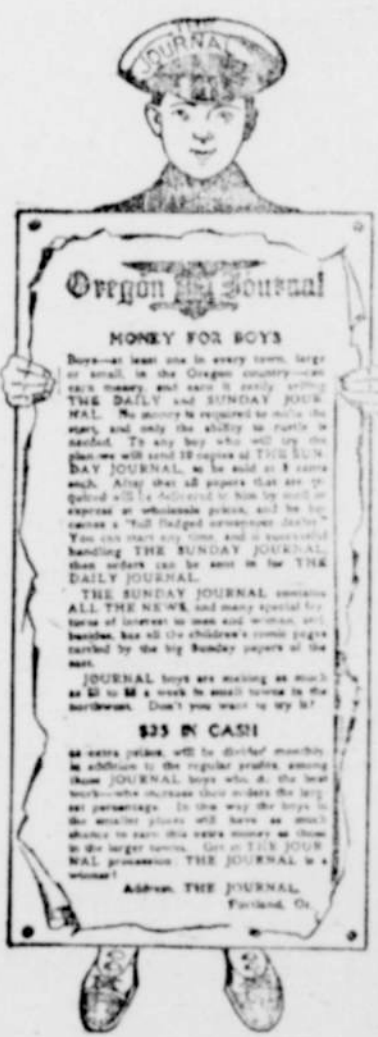
