Won Second Contest

The reading public will remember the single figures 117, and how prominently they were brought out in the Pater-McKinley land fraud trials. Prior to the time that the fraudulent entries were made in this celebrated case, several honest entries were made in the same locality. Homestead entries were made at Oregon City by Arimas C. Gaines, Wm. Moore, George Leaver, Lee James and Orvil Sexton. The claims were approved by the construction board shortly, it only for a few days' sleeping during the summer season, but out of the question as a winter habitation. In connection with a year the claims were commuted and in a short time were transferred, most of them to Wright, Biogdett & Co., at prices ranging about \$2000 per claim. Knowledge of this, the contestants will at once comply with the homestead law as to actual residence and cultivation, and that the lands were totally unfit for agricultural purposes, the final proof was contained as follows:

The proof of Arimas C. Gaines, by F. L. Jones, of Seio; that of Wm. Moore, by Mrs. Wm. Bremer, of Seio; that of George Leaver, by Wm. Bremer, of Seio; that of Lee James, by Mrs. A. Waddell, of Portland; and that of Orvil Sexton, by A. Waddell, of Portland.

In order to show the exact nature of the land, character of improvements, ground cultivated, etc., Messrs. Bremer, Jones and Waddell went to the expense and trouble of taking a photograph of the lands and had two or three views each of the improvements made. When the contest was called at the Oregon City land office, these views were offered by the contestants as evidence by their attorneys, Col. Robt. A. Miles, of Oregon City. As this was the first time such evidence had been offered in a land contest, the attorneys for the contestants opposed its admission with all the law, logic and energy they could command. The evidence was admitted, and, as a matter of course, the case was decided in favor of the contestants. An appeal from the decision of the registrar was carried up to the commissioner of the general land office, who has not confirmed the decision of the Oregon City land office. The contestants can yet carry the matter before Secretary Hitchcock, but will have to do so within sixty days from the date of Commissioner Hitchcock's decision. Should Secretary Hitchcock confirm, which he most certainly will, the contestants will at once file on the claims in question as timber lands. The evidence of the photographic views proving such indisputable evidence in this case, the government authorities pursued the same course in preparing the Pater-McKinley fraud case in 117. As it is becoming quite inadvisable of showing up the fraudulent methods by which valuable timber lands have been acquired by homesteading and otherwise, this case will draw attention and will be passed upon promptly when brought before Secretary Hitchcock. The photographic views to the government authorities show that the homesteaded lands had not been cultivated in any legal sense; that the value of the property consisted of mere board shanties, inhabitable only in the summer season, and that the lands instead of being agricultural were the finest of timber lands. The statute of limitation, perhaps, may any action against the homesteaders, but it is not late to present these five sections of fine timber land from passing into the possession of a rich syndicate without the government having received the legal price of the land. But this is only one of the claims up in the Green Hills country which are in the same illegal manner, most of it being agricultural land, though all taken under the homestead act, which requires actual residence and that the land is taken for agricultural purposes.
