The Corvallis police judge who was short \$2000 in his accounts, after an absence of two weeks, has returned.

The Albany laundry had a small fire on Monday, originating in the assay office adjoining. The loss is reported to be \$2500.

S. Young went down to see up the Lewis and Clark yesterday. He will examine it closely and if it suits him, may buy it.

Deputy sheriff Proctor came over from Albany, Wednesday, to serve papers with reference to the Williams divorce lawsuit.

Sherridan Glass and his sister, Mrs. A. L. Richardson went to Crook county to visit their mother. Their father died a short time ago.

Mr. Miller, of Shelburn, will go today to Portland to take a look at the fair, after which he will extend his trip to Eastern Oregon.

The second Williamson trial was hotly contested. The attorneys for the defense did not submit the case without argument this time as in the first instance.

Petitions for equal suffrage are being circulated and with fair prospect that they will receive the necessary eight percent of signatures.

Prof. Hagner, of the O. A. C., recently killed two deer, the report says, in self-defense. Later reports state that he afterwards paid \$50 for the furs.

Threshing is under full headway, over in Albany, prior. The grain yield is short of what was expected. Fifteen bushels of wheat per acre will be about the average yield.

Farmers will remember that the Farmers Meat Market will supply first class beef at 6 cents per pound, if taken from both front and hind quarters in as much as 20 lbs. lots.

The yield of wheat in most cases in the Albany group is reported to be light, ranging from 12 to 15 bushels per acre, though yields from 25 to 35 bushels are reported.

The bridge across the North Santiam river at 2400 City will be built by Marion and Linn counties. It has been less than twelve years ago that this bridge was built, at a cost of about \$1000.

The Portland exposition will pass the million mark in attendance this week. Probably two million, paid admissions will not be far from the number of those who attended, at the close of the fair.

Run Down and Badly Injured.

Death of Mrs. W. W. Crawford.

Last week we noted the probable fatal illness of Mrs. W. W. Crawford, of near Tallman. The end came at about 3 a. m. Thursday morning, July 27, 1906. Her husband and sons, mother, two sisters, sister-in-law and brother-in-law, were at her bedside when the final summons came eager to minister in any way possible to the wants of their dying relative. Every thing possible that loving hands could do was of no avail for the illness seemed to be mortal, almost from the first.

The funeral occurred on the following morning at the handsome home that she loved so well, and was largely attended by immediate neighbors and by relatives and friends from Albany, Lebanon and Scio.

The following funeral address was delivered by Hon. M. A. Miller, of Lebanon, a neighbor and schoolmate during her childhood:

"We have been called together today to pay the last tribute of love and respect to our departed sister, Mrs. Jennie L. Rodgett Crawford. Her sudden demise at the age when her faculties and abilities were capable of the greatest benefit to herself and her family, is one of those mysterious workings of Providence, to which we bow in submission, but with deep sorrow and universal regret. Human life is not measured by the years which it has spanned, but by the deeds it has accomplished—by its achievements in the home, around the fireside, in the family circle and by impressing such a life leaves upon the community in which it has been spent. Judged by such a standard, Mrs. Jennie L. Crawford has certainly far exceeded the ordinary limit of life and has endowed her family and the community with a rich heritage, in an honored and respected name.

Jennie L. Rodgett was born in Walla Walla county, Wash., February 24, 1861, and passed to a higher life July 27, 1906. She came with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Rodgett, to Linn county in 1885. The family resided on the Rodgett farm, near Lebanon, where the golden days of the deceased were spent. She was educated in the public schools and at Santiam Academy, Lebanon. She was married to W. W. Crawford on April 17, 1887. To this happy union three sons have been born; Ralph and Roy (twins) and George. The deceased husband and three sons, the widowed mother, Mrs. B. F. Rodgett, three sisters, Mrs. Ella Marks, Albany, Mrs. Emily McCullum-Brownsville, B. C. Miss Eva Rodgett, Lebanon and three brothers Charles and Ira of Washington and Vane Rodgett, Lebanon, mourn the loss of their beloved wife, mother, daughter and sister.

Mrs. Crawford was a pure type of American womanhood and her many good deeds will live and live forever. I wish at this time to quote from a note sent me on yesterday by her sorrowing husband. It contains this heart felt and beautiful tribute from her long life partner. "She was a most faithful wife and mother and seemed happiest when doing kind deeds to others. Her philanthropies lead her to know that there is life beyond the grave. Could each kind act be represented by a flower today, she would at present be a garden of roses."

What greater things could we say than she was a loving wife and mother. This, my friends, means everything. Oh, blessed are they who have a good home. A good home is the foundation of that which tends to make us better and happier and a good mother is the foundation of a good home. A noted statesman once remarked as he passed through a cemetery, that the greatest epitaph ever written upon a tombstone, was written upon a mother's grave. "She made home happy." Oh, what a grand thing—she made home happy. What a consolation to the relatives and friends who survive her. Gladstone, Washington, Lincoln, Garfield attributed much of their success in life to the teaching and loving care of their mothers.

What an inspiration to these boys. "Ah, boys, no more like a mother's love." The influence of women has wonderfully aided the civilization that we enjoy today.

The deceased came from the pioneer stock that planted civilization upon the shores of this splendid republic; many of whom have passed on and taken up their abode in the realms of a brighter and better land. But they have left the monument of civil and religious liberty, which shall stand to the end of time. Though their forms may pass off the stage of human action, the records of their greatness shall never perish.

"The kind acts of the deceased and her pleasant words will be treasured as priceless gems, upon our minds. She has fulfilled her earthly destiny. The stern, hard battle of life has been bravely fought, and, like a true mother, she never succumbed to any obstacle in the way of her duty in the care of her family and loved ones. On this solemn and impressive occasion, we should pause and reflect upon the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death. (The speaker here recited in a very impressive manner the poem, "Oh! why should the spirit of man be proud, etc.")

It was only a few days ago, that our deceased friend and neighbor was, no doubt, as confidently making her plans for future usefulness, as we are doing today. Her heart was glad with the anticipation of the future; but my friends, her anticipations are not to be realized. The deeds we do live after us, and, although our dear friend, whose body we lay tenderly away today, did not reach the end of life's allotted span and was cut down only a little beyond the point where the shadows turn towards the east, yet in achievement she had lived long and a well. "Woe be it

deeds, not years; in thoughts, not feelings; not in figures on a dial. We should count time by heart throbs." "He most lives who thinks most, feels the noblest, acts the best." Measured by this standard, her life was complete, and well rounded—her career crowned with success. Oh, my friends, what an example we have before us. We should live for others, as well as ourselves. We should do something for the community in which we live. We should lend a helping hand to those in need. No individual has reached the high water mark of civilization until they are willing to do something to aid those about them.

To the bereaved husband and children, mother, brothers and sisters, today we mourn with you. Our hearts are sad and every impulse of our souls is that of sympathy for you in this sad hour. That I shall not here an end. The post has well said:

Friend after friend departs,
Who hath not lost a friend?
There is no union here of hearts
That divide not here an end.
Were this frail world only only rest
Living and dying none were blent.
This world is not our home.
The equal line beyond,
Invincible as music.

Answering the "One Clear Call" our friend has "Crossed the bar." Her bark has "sailed out to sea" and what a glorious realization it is. What a comfort and consolation, oh, thought, that what is called "Death" is not the end, but the beginning of life. It does not mean oblivion, but a glorious immortality. "Death," the poet tells us, is the gate of life. It is but the dimming of the mortal gaze, and taking on the beautiful, the splendid, the imperishable judgments of eternal life.
