Dr. Brown, of this city, was called and made him as comfortable as possible. At last accounts he was getting along as well as could be expected.

Section Foreman Balmard with a force of men commenced taking up the rails from the spur, leading from the main line into this city. Just what the intention of the railroad authorities is, is not stated. The News thinks that the right of way will not be abandoned, which will result from taking up the track, unless replaced at once. The rails that are being taken up, are old narrow gauge iron and are unsafe for heavy engines and cars to pass over. While Foreman Balmard says that he is ignorant of what the company intends to do, the News is of the opinion that the spur will be replaced in a short time and that it will be operated or used by the regular train.
