Justifiable Homicide

L. D. Hedges, a rough character, well
known in Scio, who when drinking was
very abusive and quarrelsome, was shot
and instantly killed by Bob Eidler, a
logger at Detroit, last Sunday evening.
Hedges had obtained a good load of bug-
juice and coming into camp proceeded
to make things lively by quarreling and
fighting whomever his fancy dictated.
The foreman attempted to quiet him;
but instead a fight resulted, the fore-
man getting the worst of it. Hedges
then went to the cook house and created
a disturbance with Mrs. Eidler, the
cook and, it is said, struck her. About
this time Mr. Eidler appeared and com-
manded Hedges to go away. This Hedges
said he would do, if Eidler would give
him a chance. Eidler took the gun from
his shoulder. He had no sooner
done this when Hedges drew his re-
volver to shoot Eidler. Eidler proved
the quicker and a ball crashing through
Hedges' brain put a final quietus to the
business.

A coroners jury, later on, after exam-
ination, rendered a verdict of "Justifi-
able homicide." Everybody, wherever
Hedges was known, feels relieved and
says that he has only received what he
deserved and what he has been looking
for, for a long time.

Attempted Suicide.

Last Sunday a hurry call by tele-
phone was sent in to Dr. Prill from W.
B. Farrier's informing him that Mrs.
Farrier had taken about one tablespoon-
ful of carbolic acid. Dr. Prill at once
gave instruction to administer the
whites of eggs and afterward to give
mustard water in order to produce vomit-
ing. About an hour thereafter the
doctor arrived at the bedside of his pa-
tient and at once, by the use of a stom-
ach pump, removed everything from the
stomach and by the use of stimulants
brought the patient out of immediate
danger.

The causes that lead up to the at-
tempt to commit the rash act are about
as follows:

About three weeks ago Mrs. Farrier
was confined. As the accoucher was
somewhat inexperienced, the confinement
was followed by blood poisoning.

Dr. Prill was then called and in the
course of a few days the blood poisoning
was overcome and the patient in a fair
way to complete recovery. Last Satur-
day she became temporarily crazed and
made the attempt of self-destruction.

At the present writing (Monday even-
ing) Dr. Prill feels assured of her com-
plete recovery from the effects of the
poison taken and thinks, in the course
of a few weeks, she will be restored to
her usual health.

Obituary.

Alcey Ray, the eldest of a family of
twenty-six children, was born in Ken-
tucky, November 15, 1812. Her parents,
David and Rebecca Daley removed to
Jackson county, Missouri in 1816, near
Independence. Here the subject of this
sketch spent her girlhood, grew to
womanhood and was married to Francis
Prime, February 8, 1827. To them was
born ten children. Mr. Prime's death
occurred in 1843. Seven years later (1850)
she was married to Wm. Ray and to
them was born nine children. She crossed
the plains with her husband and
family, with ox teams in 1853 and set-
tled in Linn county near Providence
church where the future family home
was selected. Mr. Ray died in 1872,
since when Grandmother Ray has lived
with her daughter, Mrs. Sarah Foren.
Of the nineteen children only three are
now living, viz: Mrs. Sarah Foren, F.
B. Prime and Wm. E. Ray. She joined
the M. E. church when quite young, and
has ever lived a consistent Christian
life.
