IN THE NATIONAL HALLS OF CONGRESS

Monday, Jan. 15.

Washington, Jan. 15.—Senator Bacon today succeeded in securing an open discussion of the Moroccan question by the senate. This result was accomplished by the introduction of a resolution making a declaration against interference on the part of the United States in any controversy among European nations concerning their internal affairs. The broad scope of the resolution relieved it from the point of order made on the Moroccan resolution, and notwithstanding that Bacon referred freely to the Moroccan conference, no effort was made to put him off. He spoke long in his opposition to the policy of interference in European internal complications, pointing out the possibility of disastrous consequences, and his address brought out a number of questions and interruptions to relieve the proceedings of the characterization of a set speech.

Number of senators made short speeches against the resolution and in the end it was referred to the committee on foreign relations, and the merchant mine bill was laid before the senate. Gallinger offered a number of amendments to the bill, which were agreed to. The amendments related principally to the naval militia proposed by the bill.

A bill introduced by Smoot, giving to homesteaders on the recently opened Utah reservation an extension until May 15, 1906, to establish residences was passed.

At 3 p. m. the senate went into executive session, and adjourned at 4:02 p. m.

Washington, Jan. 15.—General debate on the Philippine tariff bill was concluded in the senate today. The bill was continued daily since January 4. The bill will be taken up for amendment under the five minute rule tomorrow, and put on its passage either tomorrow or the next day.

Any sale or transfer of a stock of goods by a merchant, in discharge of the usual or ordinary course of the business or trade of the vendor, or whenever thereby substantially the entire business or trade theretofore conducted by the vendor shall be sold or conveyed or attempted to be sold or conveyed, shall not be deemed a sale in bulk, in contemplation of this act; provided, that nothing contained in this act shall apply to sales by executors, administrators, receivers, or any public officer acting under judicial process.

SALE OF GOODS.

State Law Provides Protection for the Creditor.

Portland—The Portland Association of Credit Men, one of the state's oldest and strongest commercial bodies, has taken up the matter of purchasing goods without the buyer knowing whether or not there is any indebtedness against the name. A law on the statute books of Oregon, covering this question, follows:

SALE OF GOODS IN BULK.

It shall be the duty of any person who shall purchase any stock of goods in bulk, for cash or credit, to demand and receive from the vendor, at least five days before the consummation of such purchase, and at least five days before paying or delivering to the vendor, any part of the purchase price, a written statement under oath, containing the names and addresses of all of the creditors of said vendor, with the amount of indebtedness due and owing, or to become due or owing to each of such creditors, and if there be no such creditors, a written statement under oath to that effect; and it shall be the duty of such vendor to furnish such statement at least five days before such sale. After receiving said written statement, the vendee shall at least five days before the consummation of such purchase, and at least five days before paying any part of the purchase price, first demand and receive a copy of the statement of the vendor named in said statement, of the proposed purchase by him of such stock of goods; and whenever any person shall purchase any stock of goods in bulk, without having first demanded and received a copy of the statement, the statement herein provided for, and without having also notified all of the creditors of the vendor named in such statement, such purchase, sale or transfer shall, as to any and all creditors of the vendor, be conclusively presumed fraudulent and void. Any vendor of a stock of goods in bulk, who shall knowingly and willfully make or convey, or cause to be made or delivered, any false statement, or shall fail to include the names of all of his creditors in any such statement, shall be deemed guilty of perjury. Any sale or transfer of a stock of goods by a merchant, in discharge of the usual or ordinary course of the business or trade of the vendor, or whenever thereby substantially the entire business or trade theretofore conducted by the vendor shall be sold or conveyed or attempted to be sold or conveyed, shall not be deemed a sale in bulk, in contemplation of this act; provided, that nothing contained in this act shall apply to sales by executors, administrators, receivers, or any public officer acting under judicial process.

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Friday, Jan. 12.

Washington, Jan. 12.—Interest was injected into the Philippine tariff debate in the house today by "Moosehead's idea" tariff expressions by McCall, of that state, by a character study of the Filipino by Longworth, of Ohio, and by a defense of President Roosevelt by Poy, a Democrat from North Carolina. Besides these there were a number of speeches delivered in support of the bill, nearly all of which were in opposition to it.

During the day an agreement was reached whereby the debate is to continue for two days more. The house is to meet at 11 o'clock tomorrow and Monday to close general debate at 5 o'clock. The measure will be taken up for amendment under the five minute rule Tuesday, and doubtless disposed of on that day.

Thursday, January 11.

Washington, Jan. 11.—Before going into executive session today, the senate adopted a resolution of congratulatory support of his bill creating a national board for the control of corporations, in which he denounced Wall Street because of its alleged interference with the affairs of the country. He said that when the "street" could not dictate the financial course of the government.

Revolt Against Cannon.

Washington, Jan. 9.—Speaker Cannon's efforts to win the support over to the Hamilton job bill "Moosehead" have met with little success apparently, and the joint-statement proposition is still shrouded in uncertainty. The insurgents claim they have more than 58 votes, the number which, coupled with the solid Democratic vote, will force a consideration of amendments to the Hamilton bill. Two or three Republicans are reported to have been won over to the administration measure, through Speaker Cannon.

Inquiry Into Canal Affairs.

Washington, Jan. 9.—The senate today adopted two resolutions of inquiry. One of them authorizes an investigation by the committee on interoceanic canals into the general conduct of the affairs of the Panama canal, and the other an inquiry by the finance committee into the question of the exchange rate on the isthmus. The first resolution was reported from the canal committee by its chairman, Millard, and the second is the resolution which was presented yesterday by Bailey.

Senate Will Investigate.

Washington, Jan. 9.—All matters relating to the Panama canal and the government of the canal zone and the management of the Panama railroad will be investigated by the senate committee on interoceanic canals. This was decided today at the first meeting of the committee. The investigation will begin on Tuesday next, although there may be a special meeting in the interim to take up the nominations of canal commissioners.

Patents on Oregon Claims.

Washington, Jan. 15.—On behalf of a number of homesteaders of Oregon, Senator Gearin has requested the interior department to withdraw its order of last March suspending patents on mineral and homestead entries in that state. The senator is especially interested in having patents issued on mineral entries where proof is complete. Assurance is given that Secretary Hitchcock will direct that patents issue on perfected mineral claims, and it is quite probable that the restrictions on homesteads will be removed.

Billion Pieces of Mail.

Washington, Jan. 15.—A statement prepared by F. W. Dugraw, Fourth Assistant postmaster general, regarding the operations of the rural free delivery service since its establishment up to January 1, 1906, shows that the total number of petitions received and referred was 51,690, of which 13,125 were acted upon adversely. More than 1,000,000 pieces of mail were handled by carriers during the year 1905. The approximate net cost of the 32,955 carriers in the service for the fiscal year was \$16,871,733.

Newlands Aims His Scheme.

Washington, Jan. 15.—The senate committee on interstate commerce met today, but there was not a quorum present, and, after an informal discussion, adjournment was taken until Tuesday. Senator Newlands, occupied most of the time discussing his plan for incorporation of railroads under a national law instead of the conflicting laws of 45 states. He said capitalization would be limited to honest valuation and actual investment.

Range War in Wyoming.

Raiders Murder Harders, Slaughter Sheep and Burn Camp.

Denver, Jan. 12.—An Evanston, Wyo., special to the Tribune says: Masked and mounted raiders, presumed to be cattlemen, last night attacked the camps of two Utah stockmasters near Bartt Fork, close to the Utah-Wyoming line, shot down A. N. Garsie and Robert Allen, herdsmen, slaughtered the sheep, and burned the camp wagons and outfits.

A camp mover who escaped the bulletrage of the raiders witnessed the battle from the brush. The raiders numbered about 20, and approached the camps at a gallop, firing a fusillade of shots into the wagons. The herdsmen were killed at the first fire. It required less than half an hour to club the sheep to death and burn the outfits, when the raiders departed. Notices of warning to other stockmasters were left with the bodies of the dead herdsmen.

Sheepmen are indignant, threaten to get even, and more trouble is anticipated. The range on which the outrage was committed has long been in dispute, and the sheepmen have been frequently ordered away.

Blames All on Morocco.

German Delegate Says Minister Misunderstood French Minister.

Paris, Jan. 12.—With the approach of the Algeiras convention, Moroccan reforms, the newspapers devote greater space to discussion of the question. Public opinion everywhere is that the issue of the conference will be amicable has been practically decided.

The "Journals" Madrid correspondent sends an interview with the German ambassador at Madrid, Herr von Radowitz, who is also the principal German delegate to the convention. The ambassador, the correspondent says, has no doubt of the favorable issue of the conference. He believes the whole disagreement is due to the Moroccan minister's not understanding or misinterpreting the words of the French minister to Morocco, willfully or otherwise, and says if the sultan's delegates try to prevent an agreement being reached by the powers, as it has been suggested they would do, they will find themselves in a most serious situation. But the ambassador is of the opinion that the Moroccan delegates fully appreciate this and will give no trouble.

FORBIDS PRIVATE CARS.

Bill Offered Congress by Fruit Jobbers' Association.

Duluth, Minn., Jan. 12.—President Roosevelt, Attorney General Moody and members of congress and the Interstate Commerce commission, will receive this week copies of a bill introduced by the Western Fruit Jobbers' association, of which E. M. Ferguson, of Duluth, is president, and which has for its primary purpose the elimination of private freight cars, the correction of refrigerating rates and bringing express companies under the interstate commerce acts and prohibiting the dealing in commodities handled by them.

The bill will be introduced in congress during the present session. It provides that roads must furnish all rolling stock required to handle interstate commerce under penalty of heavy fines. It outlaws "flexible" charges and gives the shipper an open avenue for relief against unreasonable rates.

TRAINWRECKERS WIPED OUT.

Deadly Vengeance on Rebels Who Tore Up Track.

Riga, Livonia, Jan. 12.—News has just reached this city of a daring attempt of the revolutionists to capture a military train conveying a large sum of money from St. Petersburg to Libau. A band of revolutionists having advance information gathered at Hazenpot, burned two bridges and tore up the track. Two companies of infantry, which were escorting the train, left the cars, and were joined by a detachment of dragoons. The force marched against the revolutionists, who from behind improvised defenses, opened fire on the soldiers. The infantry, after firing two volleys, which killed 65 and wounded nearly 100 of the revolutionists, charged with the bayonet, and the dragoon companies, by sabring all the revolutionists they overtook.

Pipe Line Across Isthmus.

Washington, Jan. 12.—Secretary Taft has recommended to the president that he sanction the issue of a revocable license to the Union Oil company, of California, to construct and maintain a pipe line across the canal zone. There were six applicants for such a right, but the company named is the only one which specified the price of oil if used by the government and whose offer was otherwise sufficiently definite and reasonable. It is, however, expressly provided that the license shall not be exclusive.

His Zeal Too Great.

Chicago, Jan. 12.—The Berlin correspondent of the Chicago Daily News says: Confidential information has been received by your correspondent that Russo-German relations have suffered a painful breach as a result of the discovery that the czar's military attaché in Berlin, Colonel Schebko, for a long time has been engaged in spying operations in collusion with the military attaché of France. Colonel Schebko was formerly connected with the Russian embassy in Washington, and doubtless is well remembered there.

Asks for Second Federal Judge.

Butte, Mont., Jan. 12.—A Miner special from Helena states that the Montana Bar association this afternoon adopted a resolution indorsing United States Senator Thomas H. Carter's bill providing an additional Federal judge for Montana. The association, however, takes exception to the bill, which should not provide for the division of the state into two Federal court districts, and recommends that change in the proposed measure.

Grinding Cane in Mexico.

Mexico City, Jan. 12.—Cane grinding is now well under way on the sugar plantations. The total production is estimated at 225,000 tonnes.

Luncheon Oysters.

Pick over one dozen large oysters, strain the liquor and measure it; there should be a half a cupful.
