A CHAPTER OF ACCIDENTS.

Hand Badly Mangled by an Edge in Brotherhood's Sawmill.

Father Pelletier, of the Lady of Jordan Monastery, was brought to this city last Thursday evening with his left hand very badly mangled by coming in contact with the edge saw of the Brotherhood's sawmill. Upon examination by Drs. Pratt, of this city, and Davis, of Albany, found it necessary to amputate the second and third fingers. The first finger was badly lacerated and the bones broken, in two places, but the effort is being made to save the finger. A bone in the wrist was broken also. The wound caused great loss of blood and Father Pelletier became very weak. On Saturday afternoon he was taken to Jefferson, there to take the train for Portland to take treatment at St. Vincent's hospital.

Arm Broken.

Last Saturday morning Elkin, the 3-year-old son of Lou Kain, fell down the stairs at the family home resulting in breaking the bones in the elbow of the right arm. Dr. Pratt was called and reduced the fracture. The doctor thinks no permanent injury will result.

Ribs Broken.

Last Saturday Wm. May and others were out chasing after foxes. A fox was found and, in the hunters' vernacular, "freed." Mr. May stood upon his horse in order to reach the limb upon which the fox was ensconced. The limb was broken and Mr. May fell, striking the horse's hip with his right side, breaking one rib and otherwise jamming the entire side. Bill thinks fox-chasing an expensive and painful pastime.

Eye Injured.

W. A. Ewing was engaged last Friday in pruning a grape vine at his home in this city. In trimming a vine, which he let loose of it, it rebounded and struck him in the right eye, giving it a painful though temporary injury. Al was compelled to carry the injured member in a sling for several days.

Track May Be Abandoned.

A dispatch from Eugene to the Port and Oregon Journal states: A well-placed railroad man has given out the information here that the Southern Pacific Company intends soon to abandon that stretch of railroad on the Woodburn-Natron branch lying between Tallman and Scio because of the great difficulty in maintaining the long bridge across the South Santiam River. The river is continually shifting its course, and bridge after bridge has been built only to be washed out by floods. If a flood should occur this winter a new channel would be cut and the bridge left high and dry, necessitating the construction of two or three more spans to bridge the new channel. It is said that after the abandonment of that stretch of track trains on the South end of the line will be run between Natron and Tallman, thence to Albany on the Lebanon branch and on the North end between Woodburn and Scio.

A. J. Johnson Farm Sold.

The Corvallis Times states: The sale of the Arch Johnson farm 10 miles south of Corvallis is announced by Ambler & Watters, who made the deal. The farm comprises 1300 acres, and the purchasers are said to be three Portland business men, who make the buy as a side investment. The figures have not been given out, but are guessed at by persons familiar with the farm as likely to be \$20 per acre or a total of \$26,000. The deal is the largest that has been made in the county for some time. The fact that it is Oregonians who are buying the farm is a good sign, as it shows that they have faith in their own state, particularly in Benton county.

Malicious Destruction of Property.

Last Saturday night four young men, said to live in the vicinity of Crabtree, were in this city and before they started for their homes, became pretty well filled with tarantula juice. As they passed out of town, towards West Scio, they damaged fences, demolished gates, etc., to considerable extent; also along the road to West Scio, Mr. Munkers' fence was torn down by them. The young men reported to be the guilty parties are Walter Alvin, Jesse Mattheis and a son of each Marion Crabtree and Henry Kinn. Just why the young men wished to indulge in such wanton, malicious mischief is difficult to understand. Before the matter is ended they will probably wish they had passed along the road peaceably to their homes.
