Good Dirt Roads. A Missouri authority states that good dirt roads, equal to a race track, can be maintained throughout the year at a cost of about 10 cents per mile per year.

After a road has been properly graded, so that the water will not collect in the center, pack and leave the road smooth. It is necessary to go over the road but once on each side at one day.

The drag made by plowing a log 10 to 12 inches in diameter, and 10 to 12 feet long. Then with a 2-inch auger bore three holes in each half at or near the ends and in the middle and pin the halves together as if for a three-rung ladder, with the split side of a same direction. Put the road on the drag, split side, forward, by means of a log-chain or rope, so that the drag will draw an angle of about 45 degrees, by making one trip on the road, driving the log to the center, pack and leave the road smooth.

It now develops that the young society has had smallpox and the malady is well scattered. It is not known how many people have been exposed to the disease. But the next few days are likely to tell the tale, and it is feared that others of those exposed may come down.

The quarantine regulations adopted yesterday afternoon by Dr. Davis, acting for the county, and Dr. Laird for the city, it is believed, are sufficient to confine the disease to the houses in which it first appeared, and should any other cases develop further steps will be taken to prevent the spread. As a precautionary measure the schools will be closed for a week or two and the greatest care will be had by the city authorities to prevent the disease from gaining a further foothold or from being communicated to other cities and the surrounding country.—Tuesday's Herald.

SMALL POX AT LEBANON.

Dr. W. H. Davis, the county health officer, went to Lebanon yesterday afternoon in response to information that a disease believed to be smallpox had appeared there. On his arrival he made an investigation and found that the disease had appeared in four different homes, four cases being in the city, and it is feared that a number of others have been exposed and that more cases may appear. Dr. Davis, as county health officer, at once established the strictest quarantine over the four homes in which the disease was found.

Several cases of chicken pox were also found and steps taken to prevent the spread of the disease, which is not dangerous.
