TO ASSESS AT CASH VALUE.

At last Assessor McKnight is getting
down to the right plan in listing prop-
erty for assessment purposes as the fol-
lowing circular letter shows:
TO THE TAXPAYERS OF LINN COUNTY
Having decided to abandon the old
method of assessing property on the per-
centage plan, and to assess at true or
cash value, I thought best to make the
change in the assessment of 1906, now
at hand. The change is made for the
purpose of complying strictly with the
letter of the law and with the hope of
getting, perhaps, more equitable
assessment. It is possible that we may
be able with full cash value to arrive at
a better adjustment of some species of
property, at least, if not all of it.

It is to be supposed, of course, as the
assessor is claiming, by many if all
that a note secured by a mortgage should
not be assessed. This is a wrong im-
pression, and we believe there is not a
single Linn County owner of property
of this class who will compel a search of
the records to reveal its identity. I
think we have right to expect in these
two columns, the coming year, a large
increase.

There has been much agitation the
past year by howling secessors on
assessment and taxation and a desperate
effort made to create in the minds of
the people the idea that assessors were
discriminating in favor of corporations.
When you have any doubts on these
questions please come and look it up for
yourself. Our tax system may not be
perfect but it will compare favorably, I
think, with any state in the Union and
our taxpayers just as honest, but let us
not forget that the surest road to reform
in any direction is first "to skin our
own backs."

Now we are going to pass around the hat again and
this slight explanation is made so that
you may have an understanding of the
situation before the deputy reaches you.
Thanking you for the courteous treat-
ment of myself and deputies in the past,
and promising you my best efforts for a
more equitable assessment in 1906, I
