NON-PARTISANISM THE KEY TO THE ENFORCEMENT OF LAW.

The American people, as a whole, to be law-abiding; yet in every class of society, in every walk in life, are men who habitually transgress law to as great an extent as personal safety will permit. Such people seem to think that laws were made to be evaded rather than to be obeyed. While it is true that transgressors of law are blamable for their transgressions, a large degree of blame attaches to officers whose sworn duty is to execute the law. When an officer seeks how not to perform his duty, and searches for so-called legal excuses to allow the guilty to escape, the wonder is that there are any truly law-abiding citizens.

Large corporations employ the ablest legal talent available, whose annual salary would not be considered insignificant by a European potentate, whose principal duty is, not to interpret the law and guide their principles through legal channels, but to study up methods and ways by which the laws may be evaded. Such has been the action of the railroads, the Standard Oil, Beef, Sugar, and Steel trusts, the coal operators, and in fact all large corporations can safely be accused of violating or evading law in some way.

State and municipal governments are found to be corrupt and are honeycombed with grafters. Our brightest legal luminaries will not hesitate to accept a fat retaining fee from the rascal that he or they know to be guilty of the crimes charged. In the humbler walks of life violations of law, generally of a petty form, are becoming far too common.

When one considers this great array of unpunished criminals the question is necessarily forced upon him, "Can the great American body politic be considered a law-abiding people?" The query will also be forthcoming, "Whither are we as a people drifting, and what will be the final result to the Nation, unless a radical change for the better is soon brought about?"

But all is not gloom. There are evidences all over the country that the great undercurrent of popular thought is having its influence. Men like President Roosevelt, Governor Folk, Senator La Follette, Mayor Weaver, Attorney Jerome, and others, are becoming the mouthpieces of the law-abiding citizenry. They are becoming emboldened by the approbation of the public and as a result, the law-breakers and law-evaders are becoming alarmed. Courts, before whom a few years ago it seemed impossible to obtain convictions of these millionaire rascals and grafters, now have their ears trained to the demand of the people for common honesty and observance of law, and seem inclined to render decisions in accordance with right and justice. In other words, the common people, who believe that law was enacted to be obeyed, seem now about to have an inning.

Now that so good a start has been made towards honest administration of government and the execution of law, it behooves the people to keep the ball, labeled "Good Government and Rigid Execution of Law Without Fear or Favor," rolling. It behooves us to discover more Roosevelt's, more La Follette's, more Folks, more Weavers and Jeromes. Our troubles heretofore have not been lack of law, but lack of enforcement of law. These men have been elected to office, not as Republicans nor as

Democrats, but as men who believe public office is a public trust and who are brave enough to enforce the law without fear or favor, from friend or foe. They are essentially non-partisan in their official acts, and being so, earn the approbation of all law-abiding people, regardless of party.

As blind, unwavering party fealty has been the cause of our political undoing, non-partisanship will be the power that will save the Republic and preserve that liberty that is dear to every honest American heart. Men and the things they stand for must be the test when we select an official.

THE BATTLE OF BALLOTS.

On Monday the biennial election for the selection of State and County officers was held. Despite the strenuous efforts on the part of the Republican managers and newspapers in wielding the party lash, there never was an election held in the State that gave evidence of such small regard for party fealty. The voters demonstrated to a certainty that men and measures controlled their political action, almost in entire disregard of party alignment.

The overwhelming veto administered by the people upon the million-dollar appropriation by the last Legislature, should be a warning to future Legislatures that such gross extravagance in the appropriation of the people's money will not be tolerated. As this is the first time the people have used the veto power and, seeing how effectually they can block extravagant and unworthy appropriation of public money, it may be taken for granted that any appropriation in the future must be meritorious in order to escape their condemnation. It may also be taken for granted that in the future, when money is asked for in such liberal amounts as have been granted in the past, the people will require a full measure of value in return for all moneys expended, especially in State Collegiate institutions. They will question the wisdom of the State expending from two to three hundred dollars per student at the State University, the Oregon Agricultural College, and the Normals, when but eight to ten dollars per scholar can be given to the public schools.

Governor Chamberlain's re-election is and must be regarded as an endorsement of his official acts as Governor during the past four years. Nevertheless the Republican newspapers and spellbinders sought to show in every way possible that Governor Chamberlain was not responsible for any of the good things that occurred during his administration, and that he was responsible for all the bad things, which by the way were few, they could not stuff such balderdash down the throats of the people. The people believed what the Governor said in his public speeches all over the State. They believed that he had made good in the past and would make good in the future. By virtue of the Initiative laws enacted by the people, measures that he had recommended in messages to the Legislatures, Governor Chamberlain will be able to show during the coming four years that the State government can be supported without the necessity of a direct tax upon the people to do so. This is a task and duty that will devolve upon him, and if he is aided where necessary by the Legislature and State officers, the people do not doubt his ability to make his words good. The people have again trusted him, and who ever knew George E. Chamberlain to violate a trust?

Senator Arthur Pue Gorman, of Maryland, is dead. Senator Gorman was of that school of politics which believed in building up a political machine and the manipulation of the votes of the people to serve his own interests. The quicker the Gorman's, the Platts, the Aldriches, the DePewas, and politicians of that class are eliminated from American politics, the better it will be for the Nation.

Linn County, by a large majority, has declared for prohibition. Now let the law be enforced to the letter. Let drug stores be compelled to live up to the spirit of the law. Blind pigs, gallon-houses, etc., should not be allowed to exist. Let us make Linn County in truth and in spirit a prohibition county.

The election has demonstrated that, while there are a few more Republicans than Democrats in Linn County, the people will not vote for a man for office whom they believe to be unworthy. They will not tolerate as a candidate for office a man whose public acts are of questionable character.
