LOCAL

Annual school meeting next Monday. Rain will destroy much of the strawberry and cherry crops. The land trial trials will be on again in Portland the last of this month. Lebanon now has, or will have in a short time, Rural Mail Route No. 4. We are selling Carr-Scott engines and threshing machines. Charles Wooley. Let the spirit of repair and rebuild not stir until all evidence of the fire has disappeared. Weedy & Cain are erecting a large chicken house on the vacant lot opposite the City Hall. Garland & Bilyeu have bills up advertising the sale of 40 head of range horses today (Friday). The general class at the Oregon Agricultural college, Corvallis, this week numbers 47. Judge Stewart came over from Albany Wednesday morning to look after road matters up on Corvallis. Mrs. R. Shelton and daughter, Audie, moved home from Corvallis Thursday for the summer vacation. A shower of rain and then some, has been the weather forecast, or rather aftercast, for Scio this week. John W. Garland and Geo. M. Bilyeu arrived in last Friday with a bunch of Eastern Oregon range horses. Two Sisters, of San Francisco, have arrived in Albany to take charge of the new Catholic hospital at that place. The Albany Brewery, nevertheless, the county has gone "dry" purpose to do business at the old stand, the same as ever. Mrs. Mand Conaway, of Portland, came up last Friday for a few days visit with her parents Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Bilyeu. Workmen commenced recovering the bridge last Friday, which was made necessary by the injury caused by our big fire. Come and see us before you buy. Chas. Wooley. Varda Shelton passed through town Monday en route for Fall City, Polk County, where he expects to work in a sawmill. J. P. Crabtree went to Portland Tuesday to attend the Indian War Veterans and Pioneer meetings that occur there this week. There is a large possibility that before the summer is ended our burned district will be covered with a handsome concrete block. Lee Armstrong, the Lebanon miller, came over from Albany Tuesday morning, enroute for a visit to the farm on Beaver creek. Dr. A. G. Pyle went to Portland Tuesday afternoon to procure a supply of surgical instruments to replace those destroyed by our late fire. The engine at the Monks' sawmill got somewhat frisky last night and ran away. When it stopped, it was very badly burned in many places. Next Sunday the C. & E. R. R. will place its regular tourist excursion train from Albany to the Bay in commission, to continue during the season. In another week E. C. Peery's drug store and Hibler & Gill Co.'s dry goods house will be ready for business. They will have something to say then. Since the fire, business in the carpentry line has been poor. Every man in town that can shove a jack plane or drive a nail can get employment. S. A. D. Pater, the hero of the 11-7 campaign, now in custody in the Multnomah County jail. The delayed sentence will be pronounced against him in a short time. The News editor and wife started this (Thursday) evening for a brief visit to Jackson County, expecting to return and be ready for business again next Monday morning. Specimens of the hemp plant of this vicinity, show that the plant is making a fine growth and is fast to come up, fully, to the expectations. Every body is ready to have the rainy weather cease. Last Summer it was too dry. This Summer is just the reverse. Injury to crops will commence to be estimated in a short time. Miss Sue Beckenridge, of Albany, and Miss McCornick, of Lebanon, were awarded free trips to the Yellowstone, by the Oregonian, on its special subscription contest. The Lebanon railroad out from Albany is to have another round trip added to its schedule of trains. Three round trips daily instead of two as heretofore, will be greatly appreciated by the traveling public. Henry Myers was in Dallas last week, acted there as a witness in a lawsuit before a justice's court. The case was against Clem Goff for overdriving a horse. Goff won out. The case was appealed to the Circuit Court. The county court has purchased a rock quarry, situated near Rowland, to supply rock for road purposes. In this part of the valley there is no river gravel; hence crushed rock is the only alternative for firm road beds, in the winter. Either our Lebanon contemporary fails to correct his market report, or else their wheat merchants are somewhat behind the market buyers at other points. The Lebanon quotations last week were 60 cents, while Scio was paying 65 cents for wheat. Portland and Oregon City were in darkness the first two weeks because of the destruction of the dynamite at the General Electric station at the Falls city. The Portland-Oregon City electric car line also was out of commission for the same reason. The Willamette Valley Assessors in session over at Albany this week, decided to assess the main line of the S. R. railroad for taxation purposes at \$19,000 per mile to include rolling stock; the Woodburn-Springfield branch at \$8,000, and sleeping car companies at \$400 per mile. It is now reported that the gerrymandered district east across the North Santiam has first reported "wet" instead of "dry" as first reported. All of the newspaper reports that we have seen indicate the first report to be correct. The last is a flying report that came over from Dayton. George C. Brownell, the political boss of Clackamas County, is down and out, having been defeated at the late election by nearly 500 votes. His reputation as a grafter ought to have brought this result about years ago. Anyway men with Federal indictments hanging over them are not in very good color in Oregon now. General Miles probably feels a greater degree of satisfaction, from the exposition of the beef packers filthy methods and their use of over ripe meats, than any other man. It will be remembered that the government practically turned him down for making complaint of those same meat packers, during the war with Spain. Repair work on the Scio Hotel was commenced on Monday morning. When the sils of the main building were exposed, they were found to be perfectly sound. J. S. Morris informed us that Uncle Dan Morris (his father) and himself hewed the sils and other work on the hotel building two years ago. County Clerk Fields, of Multnomah County, has a remedy to cure many of the election boards and also for the purpose of explaining to voters such things concerning an election that they do not understand. He would have election supervisors appointed, one to serve at each polling place. These supervisors would be thoroughly instructed, beforehand, relative to all matters that might be misunderstood, making the necessary returns of papers, etc. This might work all right providing the supervisor would not throw his influence to either side. But the chances are the political boss would be restored with more power than ever.
