RESULT OF VOTE.
The complete vote on the various propositions submitted to the people under the provisions of the initiative and referendum law is now on record. Aside from woman suffrage and local option, the vote on which subjects has been published heretofore, the results were as follows:
Approval of \$1,000,000 appropriation for harbor road—Yes, 31,323; no, 44,525; majority against, 13,202.
New method of amending constitution—Yes, 47,661; no, 18,751; majority for, 28,910.
Prohibiting free passes—Yes, 57,281; no, 16,779; majority for, 40,502.
Tax on gross earnings of sleeping car, refrigerator car and oil companies—Yes, 49,039; no, 9,440; majority for, 39,599.
Tax on gross earnings of express, telephone and telegraph companies—Yes, 70,872; no, 6,300; majority for, 64,572.
