THE INITIAL STEP TAKEN

The Landon Mills, Timber Holdings and Adjoining Timber Tracts Sold to Parties Who Will Build a Large Lumber Plant.

The News has often spoken of the immense timber resources on Thomas and Crabtree creeks. It, in fact, could see thousands of feet of valuable lumber coming from these localities daily. These dreams may have had a sort of pipey sound, with the realization in the far distant future. But recent events go to show that these pipe dream visions are close at hand and that the preliminary steps toward their realization have already been taken.

A capitalist, who has a large and compact body of timber on Thomas Creek, and who has an abundance of money, purpose to build a railroad from this city to his property, the road in all probability to be built next year. Upon the strength of this rumor certain Pageet sound parties have purchased the Landon Mills and timber holdings up in Ell-you Den and are also buying tracts of timber within reach of the large mill they propose to erect near the site of the mill just purchased. The proposed mill will have a capacity of 30,000 or more feet daily. These men are experienced lumbermen and certainly would not invest less to fifteen thousand dollars in a lumber deal, unless they expected to have some practical means of getting the lumber to market. The present mill is capable of cutting more lumber than would supply the home demand, and to haul lumber to the railroad by team for shipment would be too expensive.

It may be relied upon that these men know what they are about and that they are not going to let their money up in an unprofitable property. While the development of these properties the development of this section of the Foris of the Santiam is assured. A railroad, even if it is but a logging road, means the employment of a large number of men, who will draw their sustenance from the farmers in the immediate vicinity of Scio. This means a great market for our products in a home market, an increase of our mercantile establishments, the location of manufacturing plants, the building up of our schools, etc. We may be indulging in a pipe dream still, but the future for Scio, to say the least, looks auspicious.

In addition to the above, a Mr. Carpenter, a capitalist from Los Angeles, and who is looking after investments in timber lands, was here last Sunday looking up matters in this line. He travels in an automobile so that he may visit any locality he might desire.

HAVE RETURNED.

Late on Thursday, night of last week the Marion Lake party, consisting of Dr. J. G. Gill, Dr. A. G. Prill, Ed. Myers, H. M. Myers, and Charles Wesely, of Scio, returned from a successful trip to Marion Lake, where they were engaged in a hunt for deer. The party left Scio on August 12, returning on the 24th. All reports having a good time, but say the trip to be enjoyable should cover a month's time.

After leaving Detroit the party made the first camp at Independence Prairie, where enough of toothsome mountain trout were obtained for supper and breakfast. Independence Prairie is 22 miles from Detroit. Early on the morning of the second day, Wesely, Morrow, and Prill left camp for Bowman's cabin, where a sulphur spring exists and a place which is frequented by deer, in quest of which a careful search was made. Under the direction of Prill, a venison Charles Wesely was able to take a shot at a white shirt hanging in a tree, and was so lucky to secure a deer. His companions, however, were able to convince him of the mistake he was about to make.

Marion Lake was reached at 10 a. m. on August 15. A camp was selected and was assigned the name of "Camp Prill." One of the party, Dr. Prill, Marion Lake is situated well towards the summit of the Cascade Mountains and is a very handsome sheet of water, some 2 miles wide and 1 mile long. Lake fishing was not nearly so good as had been experienced by some of the party on previous visits, though river fishing was excellent, the score of the entire party during the stay being 150 trout, an abundance for camp use and a supply to take home.

Much good sport was had in hunting bear and deer, of which three of the party secured. The latter were secured. The deer, a fine spike buck, provided a plentiful supply of camp meat, and no further effort to kill deer was made.

All members of the party pronounce the trip a splendid success. At no time was the party in danger from forest fires, of which many exaggerated reports were circulated.

Henry Myers, Ed. Myers, and George Morrow, on a trip from Marion Lake to Pamela Lake, where they enjoyed a day's fine fishing, joining the party on the trail coming out.

The trip to Marion Lake is somewhat laborious, but the magnificent mountain scenery and usually splendid sport in lake fishing is sufficient reward. Then the cool, bracing atmosphere once employed will ever cause one to have a hand-to-hand return, especially on a hot, sultry day here in the valley.

Dr. Prill secured a number of very fine specimens with his camera as a souvenir of the trip.
