County Officers Will Make Semi-Annual Reports in Near Future.

The work for preparing the semi-annual reports for the six months ending October first, is being prepared by the county officials. Some of the figures are complete already in County Clerk Miller's office, and are quite interesting in the way of comparison. The item for election expenses for the county this last election is especially noteworthy, amounting to \$4,299.79; while in 1904 the election expenses were only \$2,587.68. The comparison shows that elections under the direct primary law are much more expensive.
